

In an additional effort to provide you with a meaningful Easter worship experience while respecting social distancing regulations, we will also offer, at 9:00am on Easter Sunday, a drive-in theater style of worship in the church parking lot where you can worship from the comfort of your own vehicle; I will present this Divine Service to you from the south side of the building. You will be able to tune in to this service via short-range radio in the same fashion as offered during the live nativity.

FROM AN FLDEF

As we find a new routine to cope with the turmoil facing us, we find ourselves in a new normal. We are being told to practice healthy habits, washing hands, cleaning surfaces extra, keeping a six-foot distance from others, etc. But in our isolation from what we have known, I encourage you to also practice Christian healthy habits.

#1 The habit of prayer

Prayer is a way of connecting with God, to ourselves, to those around us, and those in need especially during this time of calamity. "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer." (ROM. 12:12)

#2 The habit of study

Since the Bible is God's Word, studying it is a way to know God better. 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So, what would you say to that son or daughter? I'd expect that conversation would be something like this: "I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life, and salvation, and to receive His gifts in the Word and the Sacraments. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it."

This same conversation is how we should approach the topic of the tithe. It's not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, the church is ecstatic that you're giving when you're giving in all these ways - time, talents, and treasures.

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod **Stewardship Ministry Newsletter Article - April 2020**

On the topic of stewardship, one of the most common questions a person might ask is *not* whether a Christian should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Of course, Christians should give to their church.

The most common question: "How much should I give?" But what they really mean is this: "Should Christians give a tithe of their income to their local congregation?" So, let's look at why you should or should not tithe.

Following are some reasons often offered for why Christians shouldn't give a tithe to their church.

Some say you shouldn't tithe because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. Lacking that command, there is no "Thus saith the Lord" and no "should" for giving a tithe to your congregation.

Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these, together with treasures (money), add up to more than a tithe.

Still others say they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church.

And there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of fear. If they tithe, they are afraid their gift will be misused, and they are afraid they won't have enough to get the things they use, want, or need.

Following are some reasons for why Christians should give a tithe to their

Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to give a tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to tithe and did. On top of this, St. Paul often describes the giving Christians are to do in similar terms as a tithe: a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of their income (1 Cor. 6:1-2; 2 Cor. 8:7-23; 2 Cor. 9:2-7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? The reason for the Old Testament tithe was to support the full ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry.

What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther put in the Small Catechism's Table of Duties to cover what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question about something entirely different. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? There, is after all, no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest we have, and it states simply for Christians to not neglect gathering together. Even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments. It is the goal. January – soup or stew, February – crackers, March – Mac & Cheese, **April – canned meats**, May – canned vegetables, June – flour & sugar, July flour & sugar (again), August – Peanut butter, September – canned fruit, October – pork & beans, November – dry pasta, and December – beans.

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PEACE TALK

When I was driving home the other night, the fog set in. Then it got thicker. High beams then low beams, trying to choose the optimum illumination to see where I was going. Is there a vehicle in front of me? I cannot tell. I tense up, grip the steering wheel tighter, and try to concentrate on staying in the road. Dense fog gives me an eerie, somewhat depressing feeling of not knowing where I am or what lies ahead. When I cannot see clearly, I can feel my heart beat faster. I am afraid! I seek God's help, "Dear Lord, I cannot see so please guide my steering wheel and protect me from harm." Would I have sincerely talked with God at this moment if the fog was not present? Probably not...foggy nights tend to produce deeper faith. It is the times when our faith hits "patchy fog" when we seek God's comfort. Jesus offers us reassurance in John 14:27, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you: I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." We are well aware of the global pandemic threatening our health and daily lives the last few weeks. We are forced to change our lifestyle and where we go, how we have to act. Yes indeed, we are caught between cautious wisdom and anxious fear. Jesus tells us in this verse, I give peace right in the midst of trouble, right in the midst of distress and turmoil and heartache and pressure. I can impart peace to your heart right there, and not as the world gives. Why? Because we can return to that basic relationship we have--You in Me, and I in you. Out of that comes the guarantee that He is working out His purposes. He will bring us to the end of the trouble. Just like driving in dense fog, we cannot see what trouble lies ahead. Sooner or later this fog will lift, and we will once again not feel threatened. Give this some thought; Do you talk with God more when you are afraid? Do you apply more of your time with loved ones in threatening times? Are you showing more love now to those in need? We are brought closer to God when the fog in our lives gets thicker. Maybe during this trying time, more people will see a need to place their trust in the Lord. Maybe this is a chance to open the doors of Christianity to those that do not know the love and promise given to them through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Maybe this is a time when we can find new ways to serve and praise our God. As this fog gets thicker, let's use this fear to put our trust in the Son, the Son that will clear the fog away; Jesus Christ. "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit," Romans 15:13, Amen.
