(2Corinthians 6:1-10)

PEACE TALK

Have you ever packed a lunch and just couldn't wait to delve into it? I related to that the other day as my granddaughters helped pack a lunch for a combine ride. They couldn't wait till lunch time to dig into it, in fact I barely got the machine started. I chuckled as I have done the same thing many times and then rummaged through an empty cooler at noon. Why didn't I wait! I might be hard pressed to think this is hereditary, but on the other hand; I have trouble waiting for a traffic light to change, waiting in a checkout line, or waiting for my phone to send a text message. In our fast-paced world, waiting becomes an irritating inconvenience. Do I have this same impatient nature when waiting for God? How often do we ask God for something and expect a rapid reply? Sometimes the desires of our heart take time. We know God is working in our life even though He appears to be silent, but we yearn for visible results. Waiting sometimes become one of God's favorite tools to get our attention, "Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord." Psalm 27:14. Paging through the Bible we can recall many instances where waiting and patience endured. Noah waited for rain, Sarah waited to be with child, Joseph waited in prison, Moses waited in the wilderness, Daniel, Job, Paul, I could go on, but I can't seem to wait two more hours to eat my lunch or wait a few extra minutes in line.
