Hello again,

As I write to you today, it's a pleasant August morning in McCook, my office window is open to let in the cool air and the smells of summer. As I sat down to begin my day, I began with my daily devotion from Lutheran Hour Ministries. This particular devotion was based on Matthew 16:13-20. And as I read, the author of that devotion reminded me of something I think we all lose sight of from time to time: in Matthew 16:18 Jesus said to His disciples that He was going to build His church, and He told them that He would build His church on Peter's confession: "Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! Jesus here describes the Church on the offensive—not hell. In fact, Hell is losing; have you ever thought of it that way? I think that all to often, we Christians assume a defensive role. By all the things we see and hear in the media it would seem that the devil is making great inroads, deceiving more and

more people—causing more and more corruption and suffering, but we are reminded today that God's people are carrying the battle to the very gates of hell—and beyond.

We can do all things through Him who gives us strength, and nothing will be able to withstand you with God on your side. "For if God is for us, who can be against us?"

As our children head back to school—as our own preschool prepares to reopen—and School of Religion prepares to reopen, let us never lose sight that for which we fight! Let us fight for our children and grandchildren—let us fight for the people we love, and for those oppressed, and let us begin on our knees. Let us get involved. Let us confess boldly that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God. Let us trust that God's Word will accomplish that for which it was sent, and nothing, not even the gates of Hell will prevail against it!

FROM AN ELDER

When all else fails, pray..." or "As a last resort, you can always pray...". When was the last time you heard either of those phrases or even said them yourself? For most of us, it's far too often, and without thought.

God doesn't want us to view prayer in this manner. As a confirmation student, we learned that prayer was described as a "Heart to Heart talk with God". How much more personal can you get? We have the opportunity to speak directly to our Heavenly Father, and you can be assured He's always listening. Most of the time, we have so many distractions that prayer is certainly not one of our priorities in our daily life.

Some of us have prescribed prayer times, be it as soon as we rise in the morning, some as they prepare for bed at night, and some in between. And if you are like me, it would be when the mood hits you or the demand seems to dictate it. But God isn't choosey as to when, He just wants is to do it. If we talked to God as much as we talk to our friends, how wonderful that would be, and what a relationship it would be!

Recently, I had a conversation with an acquaintance whose wife had recently passed away, after a seven year struggle with ailments and surgeries. I had often prayed for her recoveries from surgeries or her most recent hospitalizations. Sunday after Sunday, when we had the opportunity to insert her name or anyone else's name in our Sunday morning prayer list, her name was one of the first I thought of. I truly prayed for her and her illnesses, but also for her family. In a couple of conversations with her husband, I mentioned to him that I was praying for her every Sunday, for which he was very appreciative. But now since she has died, he told me one day "thanks for all your prayers", and I was ashamed that I hadn't kept up on those pravers.

In Scripture, we are told to pray without ceasing. In our elders' meetings, we pray often for Pastor Felcher and his family, as well as our church. We pray for each other, pray that the decisions that we make are beneficial to Peace congregation, and to the glory of God. As you see, the list is endless of what and for whom we should pray, so don't let the size of the prayer or how it's worded be a concern. God hears all our prayers, and He will answer them all. It may not be to our satisfaction, but remember, He is in control and knows what's best for us!

"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Ecclesiastes 9:10).

God bids us to be faithful in the tasks He calls us to do. He calls us to be members of a family (husbands and wives; fathers and mothers; sons and daughters). He calls us to be members of society (those who govern and those who are governed). And He calls us to be members of His family, the Church (those who preach and teach and those who hear and learn). Each of these callings from God places a duty on us.

As members of a family, husbands are given the duty to die for their wives as Christ gave His life for His bride, the Church; while wives are given the duty to respect their husbands and submit themselves to them as the Church does to Christ. Fathers and mothers are to raise their children in the fear and admonition of the Lord, teaching them the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Scriptures concerning Baptism, Confession, the Office of the Keys, and the Lord's Supper. Children are to honor their parents throughout their lives, and even when their parents are no longer alive, serving and obeying them, loving and cherishing them, and speaking well of them.

As members of society, God calls those who govern to bear the sword, that is, to punish those who do evil (those who live contrary to God's will) and to reward those who do good (those whose lives are lived in conformity with God's will). Those who are governed are to obey their leaders as to the Lord Himself, for their leaders bear the sword of God's temporal justice for a purpose.

As members of God's own family, the Church, He calls those who preach and teach to do so in faithfulness to His holy Word. To preach and teach the Law of God to convict the hearts of hearers of their sin and to encourage, admonish, and exhort them to do good works in accordance with God's will. They are to preach and teach the Gospel, the full forgiveness of their sins accomplished by Christ and received through faith, not by works. They are to administer the means of grace in accordance with the Gospel and the Word of God. They do all this for the young and old alike, for those who are near and far off. Those who hear and learn are to submit themselves to their preachers and teachers. They are support them by their prayers and their gifts.

Each of these callings from God place a duty on us. They make a claim on our presence; on our prayers; and our time, talents, and treasures. So, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl 9:10). Pray for your family, your government, and your church. Give of yourself by means of your time, your talents, and your treasures to your family, your government, and vour Church. That is what it means to be faithful in the tasks that God has given us. That is what it means to do it with all your might.

PEACE TALK

A few months ago, we were on our way home from Nashville and arrived in the airport early enough to see people boarding a flight to Denver. Which was our destination in two hours. So, we asked if we could switch flights if they had room. With the grace and hard work of the airline attendee, we got on board with just seconds to spare. However, it just so happened that the only two seats left were in first class. We sat down in the large seats and felt happy to be able to get to our destination earlier than planned. I felt an uneasiness in the air; we were being stared at for being the last ones to board sitting where the first to board belong, it felt we were out of place, and a stewardess was quick to point that out. We didn't pay for first-class... but there we were, plane backing away from the terminal, wondering why they allowed us on and if they were going to hand us a parachute. After liftoff, I watched the attendant giving the first-class travelers special food, drinks, and constant attention for any comfort need. The coach passengers did not get this attention. Even though anyone can pay more for a ticket and sit here, the message was clear, this area was for the elite. It didn't seem to matter that it came with a higher priced ticket. I glanced back in the coach seating where we normally sit and felt that is where I belonged. Can this feeling happen in our spiritual journey? Do we look across the aisle and feel like we do not belong? We have all experienced a sense of not belonging, missing out, being on the outside looking in. Whether it is the first day in new school, the first day of a new job, or going someplace where you don't know anyone. Ultimately, I think we can agree, it is no fun. None of us like to be left-out, none of us enjoy being excluded, none of us like feeling we don't belong. In Ephesians 2:19 the Apostle Paul tells his listeners, "Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household." Those who have come to Christ are no longer strangers, you are not going to be left out. The fear of "not belonging" is diminished with the knowledge that God has given you everything. And now, knowing that you are once and for all included, inside the family; inside the promises; inside the dearly loved prized possession of God's grace, it frees us from that nagging sensation that we might be left out. It motivates us to give thanks for what is first class in the eyes of God and what is not. Through the eyes of God, we are all equal, we are all on the same flight, same destination, to spend eternal life with our Lord and Savior. Lord, thank you for giving us all first class seats and help me keep my eyes fixed on my eternal flight plan. Amen.
