#### "A New Shepherd"

And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." (Luke 2:8-12)

I wonder why God chose shepherds to be Jesus' first visitors. Maybe it's because they were awake at night? But that seems too simple. Is it just because they were humble people? That would fit in well with the rest of the story. Nothing about this birth was glorious—except, I suppose, the angels singing!

But I keep coming back to the fact that these were shepherds—caretakers, protectors, providers. And that's one way God talks about Himself in the Old Testament—He calls Himself "the Shepherd of Israel" and calls His people His flock (see Psalm 80:1).

So what were the shepherds coming to see that night? A new shepherd, just like them. Their own new shepherd, born to protect and provide and rescue them and us both. #### The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Stewardship Ministry Newsletter Article - January 2021

It's a new year. It's a time when we take stock of the year past in order to improve the year to come. It's a time when we sit down to plan and implement what we want to accomplish and even change. Part of that is planning our stewardship for the coming year.

Often, we find this difficult and daunting and even joyless, but it doesn't have to be. In fact, it is really quite simple and full of joy. So, here are some tips to make that planning less stressful. You begin by answering these three questions:

Who are you? To whom do I aive? And how much?

So, who are you? The Table of Duties in the Luther's Small Catechism informs us. Are you a hearer of God's Word? Are you a citizen of society? Are you a member of a family? Stewardship covers these three estates: church. society, and family. We don't particularly struggle to give to society or family. Our struggles, our difficulties, and our questions arise in giving to the Church.

So, what is our duty as members of the Church with regard to giving? Again, the Table of Duties, gives us a guide. If you are a hearer – a member of the Church who receives instruction - St. Paul taught: "Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches" (Gal. 6:6). This means the local congregation is primary.

Your pastor is the one called to preach the Gospel to you and administer the Lord's blessed sacraments to you. Your congregation is the place where those things happen. Thus, when God calls us to give to the Church, He has the local congregation in mind. For "the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14).

How much do we give to the local congregation? Our only instructions are to give:

Regularly (1 Cor. 6:1-2); Proportionally (1 Cor. 16:1-2; 2 Cor. 8:12); Generously (2 Cor. 8:20);

Of our first fruits (Gen. 4:4; Prov. 3:9; Lev. 27:30); and

With a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor. 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor. 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor. 9:7), and love (2 Cor. 8:23).

In other words, giving to the Church is not to be an afterthought, given after everything else is spent. In this way, it is deliberate. We give regularly weekly, biweekly, monthly, quarterly, or yearly – keeping in mind our own strengths, weaknesses, and limitations. We set it aside beforehand - before anything else is spent.

From those first fruits, we set aside a proportionate and generous amount. Ten percent was the standard for the Israelites. This was a command for the ancient Israelites. We can give as much as we want, but ask yourself: Do we really want to be less generous than was commanded of the Israelites? Is the job of the New Testament Church bigger or smaller than the job given to

And how are we to give it? We give it with eagerness and earnestness. We give it cheerfully and with love, not out of compulsion. For through the preaching of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments, God has made us His children, forgiven us all our sins, given us grace upon grace, promised us life everlasting with Him in His kingdom, and filled us with His own Spirit, the Holy Spirit. This makes giving a joy, as Jesus said, "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

It's that easy. And it is joyful. For in stewardship, our gracious and giving Lord invites us to take part in the work that He accomplishes here on earth, providing for the ongoing preaching of the Gospel as well as those who are in need. Taking part in that makes all our work holy – work that is done in service to the Lord as priestly members of His kingdom.

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#### **BOARD OF EVANGELISM**

The Board of Evangelism would like to wish everyone a blessed new year and as we wrap up the year, we give thanks for all the abundant blessing God has poured out on us in 2020. December was one again a busy, but beautiful month for our Board as we celebrated the Advent and birth of our Savior. Thank you to everyone who helped in any way to make this year's Living Nativity a success. The comments have been so positive and it is exciting to see how this has become such a congregational project and a beautiful evangelism tool. Thanks, also, to everyone who shared the love of Jesus this Christmas by adopting the 19 Angel Tree families. Much thanks to those of you who have supported the Adopt A Chaplain Program since Peace took it on, but especially to all who helped with the Christmas mailings and to Linda Nielsen and Jane Schuster for heading up the project. We mailed out a total of 50 boxes to two different chaplains. A care package was mailed out to the one college student we received an address for. The Voter's Meeting will again be in January. Please prayerfully consider using your gifts in the kingdom work here at Peace through serving on one of the boards. We will undoubtedly continue to face challenges in 2021. Chaplain Baird is coming home and we are applying to adopt another chaplain. One of the pastors put together a spread sheet based on the regular needs of the food pantry – the staples. The spread sheet identified an emphasis that each congregation can focus on for each month of the year to help stock the pantry. Of course all donations are welcome (like cake mixes, icing, condiments, etc.), but this provides an idea of their specific needs. As discussed at our meeting, here are the items for Peace to place an emphasis on, by month. January – soup or stew, February – crackers, March – Mac & Cheese, April – canned meats, May – canned vegetables, June – flour & sugar, July flour & sugar (again), August – Peanut butter, September – canned fruit, October – pork & beans, November – dry pasta, and December – beans.

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#### **PEACE TALK**

For months, I have been longing to gaze at the year 2020 in the rear-view mirror. Churches and businesses closed or had to nearly shut down because of the pandemic. Not only did we see this disease escalate, we witnessed a derecho, hurricanes, and fires, all of which destroyed homes and threatened people's lives. If that wasn't enough, we had to watch needless riots, political battles, and attacks on law enforcement. All this was going on while small businesses were facing financial stress, we were advised not to travel or visit loved ones, we constantly were being told what we can or cannot do. Then compile this with all the anxieties from personal difficulties or the loss of a loved one. Gooooodbye 2020; BUT WAIT. I have done nothing but focus on bad things I observed in this rear-view mirror. God's people were the same way while they were wondering in the wilderness. They were feeling sorry for themselves; they were tired of eating manna; they were tired of their presumed hardships and they were frustrated with Moses. They had clearly disregarded what God has done, continues to do, and His promise to them. They wanted to go back to the way things were in Egypt. The Israelites needed better vision. How about you and me? What if I use 2020 to look forward with 20/20 vision? I must confess, I pray more and feel closer to God when things are in an upheaval. I'm sure we all have felt stricken, smitten, and afflicted; but it is in these moments when we are at our weakest and most vulnerable point. The point where we are drawn closer to God. The Apostle Paul describes it best when he confessed that God had given him the GIFT of a thorn of suffering to keep him humble and to remind him of the common humanity he shared with all other people. We can relate with Paul and the Israelites, sharing weakness, trials, tribulations, and yes... sinfulness. God said through Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness," (2 Corinthians 12:9). As we are weak. God is strong. But Paul says he is thankful even for the thorn because it is only in weakness that Christ is glorified. There is power in weakness because it is only through suffering that God's grace is made clear. We can say, like Paul, that our troubles are given to us as opportunities to come closer to God, to rely upon our faith to place all our trust in God. As we triumph over our adversities, we are empowered by God working in us. Now we can glance in the rear-view mirror and give thanks to God, who has given us 20/20 vision to see the promise He gives to all who believe and trust in Him, everlasting life. And if these sufferings bring us closer to God then we can be eternally grateful. Lord, thank you for using a thorn in my side to help me see clearer the path I need to follow. Help others to use their thorn to embrace your Grace as well, Amen.
