The Children of Light

Einstein was not all that complicated. He answered the centuries-old question of whether light existed as particles or as a wave by saying, "Yes!" He said that light consisted of bundles of energy called photons, which when they are all zipping along together, behave as a wave. Simple!

The Bible was way ahead of Einstein. The Bible refers to Christians as "children of light" (Eph. 5:8). We are individuals, but the Bible never refers to a "child of light." We are all member of one body. As we "zip" along together as little Christian "photons", we are a wave of light, children of light, who can make a real difference in this world of darkness.

There is a particular darkness that we recognize this month. January 22 is the anniversary of the 1973 *Roe v. Wade* decision by the Supreme Court that legalized abortion in our country. That decision has become increasingly dark as we have moved from abortion to late-term abortion top infanticide. We have moved from abortion laws to assisted-suicide laws to prime- time euthanasia. We have moved from legal to acceptable to laudable.

The darkness of *Roe v. Wade* gives the children of light some real opportunities to shine and this is an especially good month to think about that as January is also the month heralding *Epiphany*. Epiphany means to "show forth." The symbol of Epiphany is light. Jesus said, "I am the Light of the world."

How do the children of light respond to the darkness that is *Roe v. Wade*? The book of Hebrews offers two ways. "Remember those earlier days after you had received the light, when you stood your ground in the great contest in the face of suffering. Sometimes you were exposed to insult and persecution; at other times you stood side-by-side with those who were so treated" (Hebrews 10:32-33). The children of light are to "stand against" and "stand with."

Stand Against. In an age of moral pluralism someone must take a stand and say, "Some things are morally wrong." In an age where abortion is called "a right" and "a choice", someone has to stand up and call it wrong. To be sure, this must be done in love and with the awareness of our own sinfulness and shortcomings, but it has to be done. If the children of light will not expose the deeds of darkness, who will?

Stand With. Many have already found themselves caught up in the false hopes and false promises of the darkness. Some of these are Christians, perhaps in our own congregation or even our own family. Those hurting need the children of light to stand with them in love and respect and choose the path of light. In the case of crisis pregnancy, help them choose life. In the case of men and women suffering the aftermath of abortion, love them and offer the forgiveness and hope of Jesus Christ.

It is not easy being children of light. It is not easy standing against the deeds of darkness. It is not easy standing with those hurting in the darkness. That's why it is important to remember what God knew long before Einstein. We are not alone. We are a wave of light and working together we can make difference in the darkness of our times.

Right is right, even when no one is doing it.

Wrong is wrong, even when everyone is doing it.

'Tis More Blessed to Give Than to Receive

"In all things I have shown you that by working hard in this way we must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.' " (Acts 20:35)

And indeed, it is. Does this not strike a chord that resonates in us all? Which of us can't recall the look of surprise and thanks for the Christmas gifts that we labored to give to those whom we love? And the joy written on their face when that gift is received with thanksgiving means more than all the gifts we have received. It is more blessed to give than to receive.

Our Lord knew this because He practiced it. He gave of Himself – sparing not even His life in death – in order to give us back to our Father in heaven. He knew that in giving you get more because joy is multiplied in giving. The one who receives and the one who gives both rejoice in what is given and received. And, what is more, the one who receives only wants to give back to the one who gave so generously in thanksqiving.

So it is with our tithes and offerings in church. We want to give because we have received from God all that we are and all that we have. Our giving does not originate in what we must do to earn God's favor. We have God's favor because of His gift of His Son, given through Word and Sacrament. Thus, we are made free from the compulsion of giving so that our tithes and offering are freely given in thanksgiving for what God has so generously given to us.

Why then does the church struggle to make budgets? Why does the church always seem stretched so thin when it is the place where God continually gives us His forgiveness of sins? Why does the church struggle when God, out of love for us, generously pours out His grace and mercy?

It is because we are sinners. Our fallen nature makes us selfish and miserly. It leads us to believe that we can have our cake and eat it, too. Because of sin, we want God's grace and mercy; we want His blessings of body and soul. But we don't want to share it with those around us. We want to remain comfortable in our own self-contained, neat, and tidy lives – without the headaches of loving those around us by helping them in their time of need.

"Remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.' "Remember that God has placed you in a church, not only to receive His grace and mercy, but to press His eternal and temporal blessings into service to your neighbor.

Your tithes and offerings ensure that those around you have a pastor to preach the life-saving and life-giving Word of God. They ensure that the lights, heat, and air-conditioning are working. They ensure there is water for Holy Baptism as well as bread and wine for Holy Communion. They even ensure that your pastor has food and clothing and presents for his own family. The gifts of God are immeasurable. They multiply and redound to everyone's good as the fish and loaves in the feeding of the five thousand.

So, remember the words of the Lord Jesus: "It is more blessed to give than to receive." And remember the joy that attended the gifts you gave at Christmas. This same joy attends your gifts to the church.

PEACE TALK

Some things in life are hard to love, and one of those things for me is a roundabout. I am sure these are well thought out and make intersections guicker and safer, but all the same, I don't' like them. Is it my turn to go? Do I have the right away? Why is that guy mad at me? What exit did navigation say to take again? Maybe it is because I like a well determined path from point A to point B. But upon reflection, my path has never been clearly defined and definitely not straight. In fact, my path has included dead ends, detours and a wrong way in a one way. Maybe I could have benefited from a roundabout. How clear is the path in your faith journey? I know there are many times in my mind that I am following the straight road that is mapped out for my life. Truth be told I have no idea what path that is. Am I really listening to God's direction? If I am truly following God's directions, why does it feel like I am wondering in the wilderness? It reminds me of the Israelite's journey in the wilderness. "When Pharaoh finally let the people go, God did not lead them along the main road that runs through Philistine territory, even though that was the shortest route to the Promised Land. God said, "If the people are faced with a battle, they might change their minds and return to Egypt." So God led them in a roundabout way through the wilderness toward the Red Sea. Thus, the Israelites left Egypt like an army ready for battle." Exodus 13:17-18. There is a reason our paths are not clearly defined. God led the Israelite's in a roundabout way for reason. He includes roundabouts in our path for a reason as well. It doesn't necessarily mean it is because of sin and disobedience like the Israelites, but for strengthening of our relationship with Him. Other places in the Bible we learn about paths taken through a roundabout. Moses took the roundabout way to leading Israel, David took the roundabout way to becoming a king, Paul took the roundabout way to Rome, Jonah took the roundabout way to Nineveh. In each case God was guiding their path that would lead to a greater purpose. Moses learned steadfast obedience, David learned contrition, Paul learned patience, Jonah learned about forgiveness, all on the Roundabout Way. So, if you find yourself heading towards a roundabout, and are unsure of how to navigate it, you are not alone. There are many of us on the roundabout wondering what direction our life is going and what exit to take. But the good news is you and I are likely right where God wants us right now. Even though we might wonder what went wrong, or why we struggle to get on the right path, the lessons learned along the way is how God heals us in the roundabout way. Dear Lord, thank you for the path you have led us on, knowing you are preparing us as you did the Israelites, to be among the "army ready for battle." Amen.
