TIDINGS OF PEACE

Tello again.

As I write to you today my heart is heavy; news of recent violence in Buffalo and Uvalde have brought back memories of past incidents. These shootings also bring to the forefront of my thoughts, the need for increased diligence on our part to assure that these acts of violence are not repeated in our community.

Years ago, during a rash of school shootings, I began looking for answers to why someone would do such a thing; in my search I found a study that had been generated in 1999 by the Department of Justice - Federal Bureau of Investigation—in association with the Critical Incident Response Group, and the National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime.

The study is entitled "The School Shooter: A Threat Assessment Perspective. In 2015 the study was revisited and revised, but its findings were not that different—people hurt the same no matter the generation or time.

The premise of this study was NOT to identify and label people, but to raise awareness and educate—to make us all aware that most shooters (in this case school shooters) don't necessarily want to carry out the act of violence. Over a period of time, they will often offer clues or hints that something is wrong.

Threats may be direct and straightforward; identifying a specific target and means. Threats may be indirect, vague and unclear; using

statements like, "If I wanted to, I could kill everyone in the school!" Threats may be veiled, saying things like, "We would be better off without you." Or threats may be conditional, using "if—then" statements; "if such-n-such happens, then I will..."


It is during this time of clues and hints that we can make the greatest difference in a life, because, while not every person who exhibits these noticeable behaviors will go on to be a shooter, these and other behaviors identify a person who is hurting—a person calling out for someone to care enough to get involved in their life.

The aforementioned study takes a four-pronged approach of assessment, and is fairly involved, so I will only share a few points with you, but I ask you to find and read the study for yourself, and then step out of your comfort zone and come alongside the adolescents in your family or neighborhood. They may not fit the things you read in the study, but <u>all</u> adolescents desire the involvement of caring stable adults in their lives. The Study:

Prong one: Personality traits and Behavior: A student intentionally or unintentionally reveals clues to feelings, thoughts, fantasies, attitudes, or intentions that may signal an impending violent act.

Prong two: Family Dynamics: Student's relationship with his parents is particularly difficult or turbulent. Parents don't react to behavior that most parents find disturbing or abnormal.

Prong three: School Dynamics: Student appears detached from the Continued on page 4

Science says that we need four things to survive; air, water, food, and light. In Scripture, we are told about Jesus, and one instance the Father. In Genesis 2:7, God is described as the breath of life, in John 4:14, Jesus is described as the living water, in John 6:35, Jesus is the bread of life, and in John 8:12, Jesus is the light of the world. Jesus is all we need to live. In the words of the song, "every move you make, every breath you take, every step you take, I'll be watching you. Oh can't you see, you belong to me? How my poor heart aches, with every step you take?" This could be our Heavenly Father and His Son, Jesus, saying those words to us. Regardless of what we do, where we go, what we say, we are being watched by God. It might be said that we could feel guilty for all our actions, and maybe we should, but He is watching over us, protecting us and providing us with all that we need. In Luther's Small Catechism, we are told that "God provides all of our daily needs, He defends us against all danger and guards and protects us from all evil, and He does all of this out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me." God is watching us, but more importantly, watching out for us. He is Our Protector. He provides for all our needs. He provides for our salvation by the death of Jesus on the cross.

What Do You Have That You Have Not Received?

Some of the disciples of John the Baptist were questioning him about the baptism and preaching of Jesus. John the Baptist replies to their questions in this way: "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven" (John 3:27).

Now, John the Baptist says this to show that Jesus, His teaching, and His baptism are from heaven. But this statement is true of everything – everything that we have and are in body and soul. In fact, this is what we are taught in the meaning of the Apostles' Creed in Luther's Small Catechism.

In the explanation of the Creed's First Article, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe. Luther says:

"He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him."

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself, taking the form of a servant. Luther writes:

"(Jesus) has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity."

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Luther explains:

"That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts. sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ."

Indeed, a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. But how easy is this for us to forget about this?

How easy is it for us to think that what we have in this life is because we have earned it? How easy is it for us to forget that even all our skills, the abilities of our hands and minds – the very ethic to work diligently and to seek to get better at these skills – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said? How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone – and the work of the Holy Spirit – that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and not our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for praying without ceasing. But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven, not to earn anything but in response to what He has accomplished for us.

A person cannot receive one thing unless it is given to him from heaven. Everything we have, and everything we are – in both body and soul – are gifts from God in heaven. Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks us to – with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us.

school and students. The school does little to prevent disrespectful behavior between individual students or groups of students. Bullying is part of the school culture and school authorities seem oblivious to it, seldom or never intervening, or doing so selectively.

Prong four: Social Dynamic: Student has easy or unmonitored access to movies or computer games with themes of extreme violence. Student is intensely or exclusively involved with a group who share a fascination with violence or extremist beliefs. Student's behavior makes a sudden change.

These few points just scratch the surface of this issue. I bring these things to your attention, asking you to get involved—to do your homework—I ask you to read only studies done by credible sources—I ask you to contact the city library or a university library.

I ask you to get involved. And I ask you to pray. Thank you for listening. Respectfully yours, Pastor Felcher

PEACE TALK

Drawing a line in the sand. When I was young, if someone drew a line in the sand it usually escalated into a physical confrontation, no matter who crossed over the line first. I wasn't one of the tough kids back then so I didn't cross the line very much. Ok, I never did. However, I recall having fun listening to the stories my grandfather told regarding his episodes of a line getting drawn in the sand. No doubt the stories got better through the years, but he indicated that the line sometimes didn't quite get drawn before he was crossing the line. I tried researching where drawing a line in the sand originated and did not find a consistent source. Regardless, in each case the line in the sand set a boundary or limit. Going beyond those limits would bring consequences. So, in one way or another, I would venture to say we all have been involved with lines in the sand, and as a result have faced the ensuing consequence. Jesus might not have drawn a line but he was drawing in the sand when faced with settling a dispute with an adulterous woman in John 8:1-11. The crowd was wanting judgement cast upon her and was anxiously awaiting Jesus' decision. Jesus silenced the crowd as he slowly drew His line in the sand. After the line was drawn, it set a boundary which meant crossing it would involve consequences. Jesus looked at the crowd on the other side of the line and said, "you without sin, cast the first stone." Nobody was qualified to cross that boundary. As Christians, where do we draw the line in the sand? It is easy to cross that line when debating abortion, or if someone is being abused. But what about standing up for Biblical truth in a noisy volatile world? What about putting a stop to corrosive gossip in the arena of social media? How about taking the time to tell someone about Jesus? So many things we can do as Christians if we are willing to face the consequences. What consequences? Well, it takes a willingness to go that extra mile, spend a little more time, and engage in Christ centered conversations. It can be as simple as setting personal goals of reading the Bible, going to church regularly, or volunteering in the community. Or like Joshua when he drew a line in the sand and said "but for me and my house we will serve the Lord." Joshua 24:15b. As a Christian, where we set our boundaries, how we act, where we place our priorities, and the examples we set, will be contagious for generations to come. Yes, part of crossing the line in the sand may have negative consequences, "That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong," 2 Corinthians 12:10. But it is so worth it, "Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven," Matthew 5:12a. Dear Lord, give me the strength to cross the line in the sand, the boundaries of heavenly reward, Amen.
