Hello again, have you ever had an “a ha” moment? I had one of those yesterday (October 24) that shed a new light on my understanding of Jesus’ saying; *“Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.” (Mark 10:14-15).*

My experience began as my son and I drove through Barnett Park. We had committed to spending some one-on-one time together after school by doing some fishing, but, since it was one of those typical Nebraska Fall days with 30 mile an hour winds, we scratched the idea of fishing from the boat. We opted, instead, to see how the wind was affecting the ponds at the “goose park.” After assessing the wind situation, we agreed to head home to get the fishing equipment. As we drove through the park toward Hwy 83 south, my son asked; “What’s that spot over there by the bridge? We see people parked over there all the time; what are they doing over there?”

Well, trying to put the most positive perspective on my answer, I simply said, “Maybe they go over there so nobody will bother them.” He quickly asked if we could go check it out since no one was parked there. I agreed and as we drove to the spot, I told him that this is where the Republican River runs, but that it’s probably dried up. He answered, “I’ve never been here before, can we get out of the pickup and see it?” When Jesus said of the little children that the kingdom of God belongs to such as these, and that we must be like them, I just figured He meant we should be as open and trusting as little children who rely on parents for the needs of daily life; and while that is true, I was about to find out how much I really did

not understand.

It was in the moments that followed, as we got out of the pickup, that my perspective on Jesus’ words was greatly expanded. As my son got out of the pickup, the first thing he said was; “Wow, this is beautiful.” I had to agree with him, but in my mind, I was thinking; “But wait until we go a little farther, it won’t be so beautiful.” As I braced myself to protect my son from the expected ugliness of the underside of a bridge, as we walked the path, I quickly spotted the graffiti on the south side. In an effort to redirect my son’s gaze from the explicit language of that graffiti, I pointed to the Swallows’ nests above us. My plan seemed to work for the moment, but as we continued to walk, he looked to the north where there was similar language displayed in brighter and bolder color. He exclaimed; “What’s that?” I explained to him that it was graffiti, its just a way that some people try to express themselves. But I quickly added that it is disrespectful, and against the law. To my surprise, the only thing he said was, “It’s beautiful.” His attention quickly turned to the water below the bridge; I expected that if we found any water at all, it would just be a muddy mess, but to my surprise, the water was flowing; clear as glass. And, while I was surprised to find any water at all, my son just thought it was beautiful; he even exclaimed; “I think I saw a fish!” He would have preferred to explored further, but I convinced him that we should go. As we walked the path back to the pickup, as my son took in just how wide the river bason is, it was in that moment that I had that “A HA!” moment; because, what I saw as just a bunch of weeds—as I my mind turned to thoughts of drought and misuse of water resources—as my eyes saw a dead and dying river, my son’s eyes saw the simple beauty of God’s creation; he again exclaimed how beautiful it was, and that we needed to surprise mom by bringing

"Carried to Jesus"

Luke 18:15-17 - Now they were bringing even infants to Him [Jesus] that He might touch them. And when the disciples saw it, they rebuked them. But Jesus called them to Him, saying, "Let the children come to Me, and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God. Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it."

That last verse is a difficult one: "Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it." What does Jesus mean exactly? How do children receive the kingdom of God—and what does that mean about how *we* should receive it, too?

Maybe I'm being too literal, but when I looked back at the beginning of the story, I found this: "Now they were bringing even infants to Him that He might touch them." How do you bring infants to Jesus? You carry them, of course! They can't walk or drive or ride a bicycle. They can't even crawl. They need to be carried. For them, receiving the Kingdom—coming to Jesus—is something that happens *to* them. Somebody else does the work, and they get the blessing.

This is true for us too, isn't it? Oh, as adults we can walk and drive and go pretty much everywhere we want to. But when it comes to trusting in Jesus, we can't make that happen by our own decisions and choices. We need the Holy Spirit to carry us to Jesus, like the spiritual babies we are. And when He puts faith in our hearts, we become part of God's kingdom—all by the good gift of God. The Spirit does the work; we receive the blessing.

What Makes for a Cheerful Giver?

St. Paul wrote to Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). *God loves a cheerful giver.* But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, he gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, he prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall we say? For time would fail us to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything – yes, even His life – enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty, we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ, give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart for the joy set before us. It's the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

I had to pause for a moment, because I found myself humbled by his perspective. I think my son's perspective is part of what Jesus meant when he said, "Anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it."

But in those moments, I witnessed an awe connected to my son's humble faith that was dependent on no one, but God Himself. My son had shown me a faith response to the beauty of God's kingdom, that I myself had long outgrown. For that I will be eternally grateful.

PEACE TALK

Have you ever been "stuck in the muck?" Muck seems to be readily available on the farm, and a rainy spell is not necessarily the culprit. This reminds me of an episode years ago when I was trailing a bull home that was causing trouble by getting out of his pasture. I managed to get him to the feedlot and through an open gate I previously prepared. I dismounted my 4-wheeler to wade through the deep muck for the purpose of closing the gate. Lo and behold, there I was in the muck, when the bull turned and decided to show me what he thought of the venture. A lot goes through your mind when a 2000-pound bull is charging and you find yourself stuck in the muck. Obviously, I didn't have to think very long because the next thing I knew I was flying over the top of the gate. The deep muck on the other side however provided a soft landing. God used this deep muck and mire to protect me. David found himself in muck as well as he writes in Psalm 40:2 *"He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; he set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand."* Even though I didn't end up with my feet on solid ground, I was out of harm's way. On solid ground. How many times have you been stuck in the muck? The mire of life? Each one of us probably has in one shape or form. I know my faith is easily weakened in and amidst that muck, or despair in my life. It's during these times when I tend to lose focus that God's protective hand is right there to help. That is why it is so important when the chips are down to ask God for help through prayer. He knows when we are weak and is waiting to help set us back on solid ground. All we need to do is put our trust in Him and ask for direction and guidance. Yes, it may seem you are still "stuck in the muck", but when you place your trust in God and find His willing hand, you will also let go of your fear. I know it has helped me as I reflect back on my mire moments. I then realize how God has used certain encounters to strengthen my faith. Maybe, just maybe, that firm place to stand has led to a greater purpose God has in store for me. God has a purpose for you as well. It may never be clear to what that purpose may be, but God knows. We are told in Psalms 32:8, *"I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my loving eye on you."* In God's time, the muck will subside and the path on the solid ground will be known. Dear Lord, help me when I get stuck in the muck and guide me to a firm place to stand. Amen.
