Out of that conversation He and I scheduled a father - son BB-gun shoot. It was a lot of fun! And we have scheduled another on August 13.

But as an overarching desire to get better at being a dad, since those early days, I am always searching for Biblical resources to help me learn about being a dad. I've spoken with some of you in the past about an organization called Trail - Life USA; and while this is NOT an effort to pursue Trail Life, I have learned recently that Trail – Life USA has partnered with Focus -On - The - Family in a joint effort to provide a resource; a video series that is free on line. The videos are short and I've watched forsake not your mother's two thus far, and have found a couple nuggets of value, so I have asked Tina to provide information on how to access that if sinners entice you, do not resource.

The resource is entitled "Raising Godly Boys." The

information thus far, while it has not been a lot of "experts say this or that," the information has been very practical; things I've thought about, but figured I was the only one.

The conversation this week talked about a boy's self-worth and where it comes from. Boys hear, from various sources: piers—social media-movies, what it means to have worth, or value, but these sources can be confusing and can disagree with that which is healthy and pleasing to God. The challenge for us dads, and for moms as well, is that we be attentive to the things our sons, and daughters are exposed to our challenge is that we be available to listen to them and to talk with them—if they are watching a show, and you see a negative, or positive, example of self-worth; take the opportunity to talk about it. The message is that we communicate more often than these outside sources, with our words and with our actions, that our sons and daughters are highly valued by us, and by their Lord.

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FROM AN ELDER

Then the Lord said, "Is it right for you to be angry? - Jonah 4:4

I love the story of Jonah! It's full of drama and important life lessons. After stubbornly refusing to do God's will, Jonah finally preached a revival service in Nineveh that would have made him one of the most successful missionaries of his time. When the people repented and turned from their wicked ways—and when God relented and turned from His anger against them—you would have expected Jonah to rejoice. Instead, he was angry that God was merciful. Why? Although he was finally obeying God by doing the right thing In the right place, he was deeply flawed on the inside.

Like Jonah, if we are not careful, we can be spiritually "looking good" on the outside, but far from God in our hearts.

Suppose Joseph Stalin had repented, that he had come to faith in Christ on his death bed. Would you be pleased to meet him in heaven? Or suppose Emperor Nero or Jeffrey Dahmer or the executioner who beheaded St. Paul would greet you as you enter paradise. Suppose your place at the Lord's eternal banquet is set next to that neighbor whose habits now drive you to distraction. Suppose your place card at the table would put you across from the supervisor you can't please, or that relative you could never get along with. Would you ask for a new seating assignment?

We are all prone, you see, to Jonah's sins—lovelessness and judgmentalism. Like Jonah, like the older son is Jesus' parable, we often serve the Father reluctantly. And then, as if to minimize our own disobedience of heart, we sometimes look down our noses at others whose sins we see as worse.

How good for us that just as the Lord acted in patience with Jonah, so He acts patiently toward us, too. How good that when we blame and judge and hate, our Savior keeps calling us to repentance, just as He did Jonah. God's forgiveness and favor belong to you in Christ's cross. Fall into your Father's arms and receive them.

If God controls you on the inside, you'll be genuine on the outside.

Define Your Life by How You Give

Winston Churchill reportedly said that "we make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." According to Churchill, our lives are defined not by what we have gotten, but by what we give away.

Our Lord's life is defined in this way. He gave completely of Himself for us. He became man for us. He taught the truth of God's Word. He healed those with many and various diseases. He died the death that we deserved for our sins. He gave of Himself in order to save us from sin, death and hell. And so it is that by giving completely of Himself, He got for Himself us, making us cit-izens of His eternal kingdom by grace.

As it was for Jesus, so it also is for us. We get more from giving than we do from simply getting. For giving softens our hearts and frees us from the grip which the worries of this world and mak-ing a living has on us. For when we are singularly focused on making a living, we are singularly focused on what we get. That mindset begins to bleed into all areas of our lives — our relation-ships with friends and family, with neighbors and coworkers, and with the Lord. It shifts our fo-cus from asking the question, "How can I be a friend, family member, neighbor and servant to others," to asking the question, "What have they done for me lately?" We become more selfish instead of selfless.

But when we give, we do not have less, we do not become less; rather, we have more and be-come more. When we give, we join in the bond of friendship and family, the bond of service to those around us out of love for them. And love is the fulfillment of the Law. It is the nature of God Himself, for God is Love. Thus, we are participating in the divine nature. As Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

PEACE TALK

Oh no, not now! That's what I think when I get a flat tire on my vehicle. I did not allow enough time to deal with this right now. But there it is, flat as a pancake. It is going to take forever to get my jack out and put the spare tire on. Ugg, I'm going to be late for my appointment. By the time I get this done I will be guite dirty. How will I get cleaned up? Maybe someone will drive by and help... But nobody travels this road. Maybe I can call someone, but then again, I would have to walk to the top of the hill to get cell phone service. The Bible tells me not to be anxious about anything (Philippians 4:6). That's easy for the Apostle Paul to say. He didn't have a flat tire. For crying out loud, I had to read the owner's manual to find out where my jack is; unload a ton of stuff to get the spare out; and then wonder if I would ever get the overtightened lug nuts loose. I pause and wonder "what am I going to do?" My plans are ruined... Even though I dramatized this situation, there are many things that can cause anxiety. Has anything interrupted your schedule recently? There will be inopportune events erupting in our life that will deflate plans for the day. So remember, as we are in the midst of a frenzy, be prepared to answer God's question, "Am I in any of those plans?" We are told that our ways are not God's ways, and His thoughts are not our thoughts (Isaiah 55:8-9). With all those thoughts racing through our mind amidst challenging moments, God wants us to walk by faith and not by sight (2 Corinthians 5:7). No matter how difficult or inconvenient a situation finds us in, there is nothing that God cannot do for us (Job 42:2). In fact, just as that flat tire seemed to traumatize my day, God might have used that to make me stronger in some way. Making me realize that I need to listen to His voice as I realize my dilemma in the bigger scheme of things, is quite trivial. Paul shares another message in Romans 5:3, "Let us exult and triumph in our troubles and rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that the pressure and affliction and hardship produce patient and unswerving endurance." We all face obstacles from time to time. God doesn't remove every one of them because He just might be using that moment to bring us back to Him. When we deal with various difficulties, we often become stronger in our faith. A flat tire in my day to make me realize that there are a lot of larger obstacles I will face in the future. I must use this small hurdle to strengthen my faith for a larger one I might face tomorrow. Whatever the flat tire that you are facing today, stand strong in faith knowing it cannot restrain God's plans and blessings for you. Dear Lord, help me to not fret about my one flat tire, but to give thanks for the other three that are not. Amen.
