

FROM AN ELDEF

The book of the genealogy of Jesus Christ ... Abraham was the father of Isaac, and Isaac the father of Jacob, and Jacob the father of Judah and his brothers ... and Eliud the father of Eleazar, and Eleazar the father of Matthan, and Matthan the father of Jacob, and Jacob the father of Joseph the husband of Mary, of whom Jesus was born, who is called Christ. (Matthew 1:1a, 2, 15-16)

"Tell me about your family," we ask when we're trying to get to know someone. What can we learn about Jesus from His ancestors?

Start with Abraham—the "friend of God" who left his family to go wherever God would send him. He is a great man of faith, yes; but he abandoned his own son Ishmael in the desert, and allowed his wife Sarah to be taken into another man's harem to save his own life.

Isaac? We honor him as the young man who was willing to lay down his life, if necessary, at God's command. But he's also the father who played favorites and set up his sons to be enemies for years.

Jacob? The man who tried to cheat his way through life, only to realize in the end that God was the one who would give him help and every good thing.

We don't have time to run through all Jesus' ancestors—David, the faithful king—and adulterer and murderer; Rahab, the prostitute who saved Israel's spies; faithful King Hezekiah, who fathered Manasseh, who offered his child as a human sacrifice! Good and evil, faith and faithlessness, appear on every level of Jesus' family tree.

And isn't that the way it should be for someone who came to save us all? Jesus' ancestors are like us. We too are mixtures of good and evil; and we cry out for a Savior to help us. By sending Jesus, God has heard our cry.

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.

Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.

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ADOPT-A-CHAPLAIN

Adopt a chaplain is a program that supports deployed military chaplains and the troops they serve. With your support, there were many chaplains and soldiers who received Christmas care packages. Of 150 packages sent from McCook, the majority were sent to chaplains in Syria, Iraq, Kuwait, Poland and Korea. One of the chaplains sent this message, "Thank you SO MUCH for your support! The care packages have made a massive impact around our entire area of operations."

As a Christmas surprise, four boxes were sent to the Nebraska National Guard, Company A, 2-134th Infantry Battalion, deployed to Somalia. The 90+ members of Company A don't have a chaplain with them, so the boxes were addressed to one of the soldiers who shared with others. They sent a message that they appreciated the care packages and Christmas cards. They will be return home at the end of February.

In January, we will continue to send care packages to some of the many chaplains deployed to areas of greatest risk. All support and prayers are welcome! The next packing day is Tuesday, January 16th at 1 pm.
