Nave you ever wondered how to share time in the Bible with your teenage child or grandchild in a way that they will HEAR it? It has been suggested that the acronym H.E.A.R. might be a helpful tool for slowing down and talking briefly about God in our life. Start by choosing a short Bible reading – perhaps from a children's book they enjoy; or from a daily devotion; or a reading from a "read the Bible in a year" calendar.

After reading the verses together, <u>H</u>ighlight a verse that stands out for your child or grandchild—<u>E</u>xplain what that verse means to help your child or grandchild own, or internalize, the verse, try to <u>A</u>pply that verse to your own life, or a real-life example. And then help them <u>R</u>espond to what they have learned about God in that verse. Their response might be a response of thanksgiving, or it might be a response of I don't quite understand. Either way, their response may open the door for more conversation. If it does embrace the opportunity to talk—if it doesn't, that's ok, there's always tomorrow.

And that's the key; setting aside five or ten minutes each day to share in God's word together.

For those of us who live in the light of the Son of God who came to earth to share our burdens and to die for our sins, life in this world is something of a warm-up activity, a practice run for the grand celebration we will enjoy throughout eternity. Those who do not know Jesus ask, "Is this all there is?" And without Christ, the answer is, "Yes." Hope dies as surely as leaves on an unwatered plant dry up and drop off. Cherish What God Has Given

In the Small Catechism, Luther follows a pattern when explaining the Ten Commandments. With each commandment, there is something prohibited, and something commanded. There is something wrong which must be avoided, and there is something right which must be done.

The one time this pattern is not followed is with the Sixth Commandment.

"You shall not commit adultery. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other" (SC I).

Here, the catechism focuses solely on the positive: we should live in a chaste and decent manner in both word and deed, and husbands and wives should cherish and honor one another.

Keeping this commandment, and all of the commandments, is a lot easier if you see your chastity and your spouse as a gift from God that is to be protected and cherished. In the same way, you will find keeping the Fourth Commandment easier if you see your parents and other authorities as a gift from God, given to you for your blessing.

This is the key stewardship insight that runs through all of the Christian life: Everything that we have has been given to us by God. We deserve none of it. All of it comes to us by God's fatherly kindness and open-handed generosity. If I know that everything I have — every possession, every relationship, every ability — is a gift from God, then my perspective changes. All of these things are both gifts to be cherished, and things that I should direct towards God's purposes. My possessions should be shared generously according to how God has called me in my family, church and community. My spouse should be cherished, loved and encouraged in faith. My children are on loan from my own Heavenly Father, and I have but a brief time to show them the path of righteousness. My neighbor is a gift from God so that I can imitate His kindness toward me.

No matter the gift, everything has been given to me by God so that I may participate in His own goodness and open-handed generosity.

ADOPT-A-CHAPLAIN

Adopt a chaplain is a program that supports deployed military chaplains and the troops they serve. PEACE TALK

Use the plastic! That's a viable solution to purchasing just about anything anymore. Credit cards are simple to apply for, easy to get, and a source of available funds right at your fingertips. They are a necessity if you want to purchase something online, ensure emergency funds, or a source of protection against fraud. Depending on the card, you can even get cash back, frequent flyer miles, or earn rewards and benefits. However, the interest rates are high. If not managed properly, you will accumulate too much debt, hurt your credit score, and it will become financially burdensome. I use a credit card often, especially if I go somewhere. Using the plastic for airline tickets, parking garage, and food. Then again for gifts and attractions. Completely unaware of the balance I am building up as my mind is glazed over by the convenience of swiping my card. The secret, as painful as it might be, is to have the discipline to keep a "short account." By this I mean to keep paying off the account as soon as the bill arrives to avert paying those high rates. This is also true with Christian living. We must keep a "short account" with God and each other. That also takes discipline. If you are like me, it is so easy to get wrapped up in my job, my hobbies, or many self-interests. Not keeping God in my heart and allowing my sins to build up a large balance in that account. This happens when I ignore the warnings that I must curb my anger when things are not going my way (Ephesians 4:26-27). Failure of acknowledging the necessity of telling someone I am sorry if I have hurt them (James 5:16). And lacking the presence of mind to show others love, even those that might be hard to love. Just like Christ has shown so graciously to me (Ephesians 5:1-2). Yes, I know that I will continue to sin, but as I strive to humbly walk with Christ, these are the things expected of me. Having these disciplines is a requirement for Christian life (Micah 6:8). Maintaining my short account by confessing my sins and asking for forgiveness from a loving God who understands all my shortcomings (1 John 1:9-10). These rewards are much better than plastic. Through my faith and Christian walk with Christ, I will be aware of my balance, benefits, and rewards. No matter what my balance has been in the past, my bad credit score has been wiped clean with Jesus' life-giving forgiveness through His sacrifice on the cross (Hebrews 10:12). Just wait! It won't be long before life happens again and you will be asked, "are you using cash or credit?" No matter what you decide, remember to keep your account short. Especially with God, as we confess our sins and forgive one another continually as we walk with Christ to eternal glory. God's "credit card" is easy to apply for (believe), easy to get (grace), and a source of available forgiveness and mercy. Just keep your account short. Dear Lord, thank you for your forgiveness and promise of an eternity spent with You. Amen.
