ave you seen, or do you remember the 1971 movie; Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory?" If so, do you remember the little girl named Veruca? It seems that Veruca's parents had made it their goal that Veruca should have life better than they did—that Veruca should not want for anything. And what parent doesn't want the best for their children?

But, as Hollywood often does; the life of Veruca was taken to extreme; Veruca had become a child with an appetite that would not be satisfied; an appetite for earthly possessions and pleasures that would not be satisfied—and when she decided that she wanted something; she wanted it NOW.

The parents of this child had allowed themselves to be pushed to the point of exhaustion, affirming their actions, and consoling one another by saying; "Happiness is all that matters in a child's life—happiness and harmony."

These things were intended to reflect society going into the 1970s. And it seems that there is nothing new under the sun; even in our time, we often find ourselves confronted with the temptation of expecting immediate results and instant success in all that we do. But real life doesn't always work out that way; sometimes life is hard and tough; sometimes we don't get what we want when we want it:

sometimes failure crashes over us like an avalanche.

During these times it's easy to get discouraged, or even angry; but times of difficulty; times of fatigue and times of waiting, can be opportunities to teach our children about patience and determination—even if our children are old enough to have children of their own.

The more our kids see us trusting the Lord in these times, the more they will understand that God provides the strength to continue on.

To be sure, it's nice when failures transform into immediate success, but even times of difficulty can be turned into opportunities to help our kids grow spiritually; as they see you relying on the Lord for guidance and strength, they will learn that they too, can rely on Him when difficulties arise. So, I encourage you to be brave; stay the course; for the Lord is with you.

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FROM AN ELDER

Pastors

Acts 20:28 - [Paul says] "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which He obtained with His own blood."

A lot has changed with the Christian church in the last two thousand years. The church now is very different from what it was when the book of Acts was written. At that time, there were no dedicated church buildings, no formal Christian schools or universities, no billion-dollar Christian music industry, no Christian broadcasting networks or publishing conglomerates, no Christian T-shirts or Christian lobbyists or bumper stickers. The church back then was different. Much has changed since. But one thing has been constant: there were pastors—men called by Jesus, appointed by the church, to gather people, to speak to them in the Name of Jesus.

When the New Testament pictures a Christian, a follower of Jesus Christ, it's more than just having a personal relationship with God. It's more than having a biblical worldview. It's more than having certain moral values. In the New Testament's way of seeing things, to be a Christian is to have a pastor, or many pastors, pulling for you.

In Acts, we're told that when new communities of Jesus-followers were formed, the people who started those churches, as they moved on to start new ones in other places, they "appointed elders for them in every church" (Acts 14:23b). Later we're told that these "elders" were appointed to oversee the churches, to serve as "pastors," as shepherds for the people there. In our passage today, we hear Paul tell these elders to "care" for the church of God. Another translation renders it as "be shepherds" for the church of God (NIV), because that's what the Greek word in the text means, to be a shepherd. And that's where we get the word "pastor." Pastor is the Latin word for "shepherd."

In the New Testament, these spiritual leaders went by different titles: ministers (see Colossians 1:7), overseers (see Philippians 1:1), stewards of the mystery (see 1 Corinthians 4:1), elders of the church (see 1 Peter 5:1). But the different titles amount to one job, one calling: pastorshepherd. Of course, this job really only belongs to Jesus. "I am the Good Shepherd," He says, "I lay down My life for the sheep" (John 10:14a, 15b). And by His Spirit, we respond and say, "The LORD is my Shepherd" (my Pastor) (Psalm 23:1a). Jesus is your Chief Shepherd, your Principal Pastor. And He wants to give you a local pastor—someone who knows your name and walks alongside you, an under-shepherd who will give you a call, come looking for you when vou're in trouble. That's how much He loves you.

Mercy and Grace Lead to Generosity

Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Cor. 9:15)! This is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need.

This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives.

It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work. Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others.

But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything — life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gospel.

For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

The church is a mercy place. It's a place where God's mercy in the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, is given and received. For us who believe it means forgiveness, life and salvation in the face of sin, death and the power of the devil. Here in the church, we inhale God's mercy in Word and Sacrament, and exhale this same mercy in love and service to our neighbor. And that is an enduring, joyful thing to do. Our joy fills our neighbor's need because His joy filled ours (Heb. 12:2). Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift!

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PEACE TALK

"I found gold!" The shout that rang across the nation in and around the year 1849 that sparked the famous Gold Rush migration. The plot to seek a fortune ignited a quest for thousands of people to make the trek to California for a richer life. Tens of thousands traveled in covered wagons, risking their lives with hostile Indians, bandits, disease, severe elements, and treacherous trails. Many migrants chose to sail around the tip of South America, finding just as many challenges and dangers. The vision of wealth overshadowed all the sacrifices that were necessary to reach their destination. Even if the sacrifice was life itself. If you think about it, gold has always been precious in the eyes of the beholder. Many verses in the Bible reveal it was a symbol of earthly riches, (Job 3:15, Isaiah 2:7, Acts 3:6, Revelation 18:12). For the longest time, our eyes have seemed to magnetically focus on these earthly treasures. Where are your eyes fixed? Would you become one of the "forty-niners" if you dwelled in that time of gold fever? Matthew 6:21 says, "Where your treasure is, that is where your heart will be." Then goes on to say that we cannot serve both God and the proverbial golden nugget. When our eyes are turned to our bank account, nice car, or whatever we place great value in... that will become our priority. If our eyes are turned to these things, they will not be turned to God. Look how it turned out for the forty-niners. Very few of them ever struck it rich. Hard work, no housing, poor sanitation, and the law of the west kept most of them in poverty. Mark Twain said, "During the gold rush it's a good time to be in the pick and shovel business." That goes to show that the eyes fixating on the correct thing can be profitable. Just think about all those things the migrants sacrificed with pure tunnel vision of something that ultimately give them even less. The same is true in our spiritual migration. Jesus said in Mark 8:36, "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" There is nothing wrong with enjoying earthly treasures as long as our eyes are fixed on Jesus. He is the pioneer and perfector of our faith, (Hebrews 12:2). When we can do that, then our short-term perceptions will turn into long term realities. Yes, the journey of faith can be as long and treacherous as the Oregon trail. We can repeatedly fill our pan with gravel and shake it with hopes of finding something of physical value. But by turning our eyes to Jesus, our pan will not become a burden. He will be there to shake out the rocks of sin to reveal our sparkling fortune of faith. What we experience then with that faith will be more valuable than any size of gold nugget that appears, (1 Peter 1:7). Heavenly Father, help me keep my eves fixed on You, for there is where my treasures will be stored for eternity. Amen.
