Well, the answer was obvious, so I added, saying; "Everybody set the alarm on your phone for 1:00pm; that way,

every time your alarm sounds, no matter where you are, when you pause to pray, you can know that we are all praying together!" I made a similar announcement in church that Sunday. And the rest is history; when the alarm sounded at 1:00pm, no matter where we were, we stopped what we were doing, and we prayed together as a church family.

I remember a church picnic when everyone's alarms sounding at the same time, and everyone exclaimed, saying; "It's time to pray!" What a heartwarming sound to my heart.

I the midst of this busy year, I found myself failing to start our family's day with prayer, so I accepted that person's challenge again. I set the alarm on my phone for 7:20am. Now, when that alarm sounds, someone in the house shouts; "TIME TO PRAY!" Then the last-minute hair combing and tooth brushing and backpack packing all stop, we gather together, and we pray as a family. I feel so much better when we pray together as a family before going out into that great big world.

So, I invite you to accept the challenge; if you'd like to pray with our family; set your alarm for 7:20am. But I encourage you to find a time that works for you.

And, may this challenge encourage you to; "Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1Thessalonians 5:16-18)

Thanks for reading, and may you be blessed to hear among you, shouts of; "It's time to pray!"

Rooted in Christ, Growing in Stewardship

The heartland is now awash in various hues of green. The doldrums of winter give way to the colors of spring. Now, the promise of spring gives way to the growth of summer. Fields are planted and sprouted. Gardens are planted. Flowers adorn the beds of neighborhood homes and roadside ditches. Green is the shade of life!

Green growth is also the hue of the faithful steward. The seed of faith planted in human hearts in the waters of Holy Baptism grows as it is nurtured in the Word proclaimed and ingested in the Holy Supper. This faith does indeed save. But our stewardship of the Gospel is also designed to bear fruit for God's glory and the benefit of our neighbor.

To consider this, let us look at the hymn, "Fruitful Trees, the Spirits Sowing" (LSB 691). It is very much a stewardship hymn!

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's sowing, May we ripen and increase, Fruit to life eternal growing, rich in love and joy and peace.

- The tree of faith is not planted in us by us. It is the Spirit's work! We do not claim the title "steward." Rather, we are created for it (Gen. 1:26–28).
- \cdot He is the One who makes it grow in us. The fruits of the Spirit are borne out because we, by grace through faith, are connected to the vine that is Jesus (John 15).

Laden branches freely bearing Gifts the Giver loves to bless; Here is fruit that grows by sharing, Patience, kindness, gentleness.

- · Our stewardship is NOT about what we do. It is about what the Holy Spirit does in and through us. That is the fruit that we bear. His fruit for His purposes.
- · But that fruit is lived out through us. The world sees the fruit of our stewardship of the Gospel in lives lived connected to Word and Sacrament.

Rooted deep in Christ our Master, Christ our pattern and our goal, Teach us, as the years fly faster, Goodness, faith, and self-control.

- · Stewards have been created and redeemed to reflect the image of Jesus in the world. He is the pattern. We reflect to others around us the Light of the Gospel He has shone on us.
- · This reflection comes when Christ's goodness flows from us to others.

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's tending, May we grow till harvests cease; Till we taste, in life unending, Heaven's love and joy and peace.

- · Just as the Spirit has created us for stewardship of the Gospel, so also does He cause our faithfulness! He calls, gathers, enlightens, sanctifies and KEEPS us in this faithful stewardship of the Gospel.
- The ultimate goal of our faithful stewardship is eternity. For us. For our neighbor. All worked out by the Spirit.

Green is the color of the world right now. It is also the color of our stewardship and it is growing in us as we are connected to the vine, Jesus! God grant our growth in Him!

PEACE TALK

Why did the chicken cross the road? This timeless question never seems to lose its luster. Presumably since the answers to this age-old dilemma are quite plentiful. As we debate over the answer to this question, keep in mind that the outcome is derived from none other than, "a bird brain." Does he just want to get to the other side? Maybe it is much too far to walk around. Or could it be to prove to a skunk that it can be done? Since these possibilities are somewhat mundane, I thought I would seek answers from a few ancient wise theologians. Saint Augustine, who crossed roads with many Chistian's, said this about the question at hand... "Well, he was a bad egg from the moment he was laid." John Calvin gives an analysis of how he sees it, "The chicken is thus predestined to cross the road." Then I couldn't help but to ask Martin Luther. He adds, "The chicken is justified in crossing the road by faith alone, holding fast to 95 reasons not to pay tolls to big bird." Probably too many "chicken" nuggets of information. How am I going to find the truth when these erratic answers are ruffling my feathers? I'm sure if I sought wisdom in today's world, a free-range mentality would unveil a whole new set of cackles. Even though this is all in good fun, it made me realize how complex asking one simple question can reveal such a myriad of workable quips. We might do well to look beyond the humor and focus on the truth that the chicken did in fact cross the road. Does it really matter why? The reality of the chicken crossing the road, justifies whatever situation in turn led to its decision. For whatever reason that may be. How about you? Have you crossed any roads lately? It could be one of many roads including recovery, goals, or fulfillment. Truth to be told, there are a ton of roads that will be crossed at some point in your life. Therefore, if someone would ask, "why did you cross the road...?" Just the fact of crossing that road justifies the "why." God is waiting for you to cross another one right now, (Jeremiah 6:16). He won't ask why. He just wants you to cross the road and follow Him, (John 14:6). Following Jesus down the Romans path to salvation. Including constructions zones of repentance (Romans 3:23). Avoiding deadly detours (Romans 6:23). And keeping the navigation set on Jesus for your salvation, (Romans 10:9). Then you will be prepared to answer the guestion, "why did you cross the road?" With only one answer to give. To get to the other side. The side where Jesus will give you hope and a future, (Jeremiah 29:11). The side where Jesus bestows His grace of forgiveness upon you, (Ephesians 1:7). And best of all, the side of the road that will provide you with a promise of eternal life with Him, (John 3:16). Dear Lord, thank you for showing me the "why" when you took me under your wing.
