Hello again, as I write to you, I reflect on the many experiences of the National Youth Gathering in New Orleans Louisiana: the many speakers—the worship—the music—and yes, the humidity.

Every experience was intended to build our Youth up in their faith. The speakers all encouraged and informed our Youth, but something was said by one of them that pleasantly surprised me. A speaker named Bethany Hamilton encouraged our young men, saying; "We need you to be men. Our families need you to be men. Our country needs you to be men."

Bethany Hamilton is well known for inspiring and equipping the next generation to live unstoppable lives while overcoming life's difficulties. She encouraged our Youth to A.D.A.P.T. to appreciate God's grace each morning. To look to God's word for direction; directing them to Proverbs 3:5-6. Seek out healthy associations; surround yourself with the great cloud of witnesses of which St Paul speaks. She encouraged our Youth to persevere; directing them to James 1:12. And Bethany Hamilton encouraged all of us to be teachable; to learn from our mistakes, and to be willing to listen to coaches, teachers, and parents. The implication is that it's not so much about the success at the end

of a journey, but it's about the journey itself. This is just a basic overview of Mrs. Hamilton's presentation, but it was in light of these things that she encouraged our young men to be men.

The reason I found myself surprised by Mrs. Hamilton's words is that ever since my family moved to California in 1967, the only one who spoke that way was my dad. He liked the word; "macho," but what he meant by that was, be a gentleman, be truthful and honest, be helpful and kind—never hit a girl or be mean. But, I'll never forget the first time at elementary school, when I opened and held a door for a girl in my class, only to have her, and many other classmates yell; "YOU MALE CHAUVINISTIC PIG!" I didn't even know that was a thing. But through other experiences it became very clear that it was socially unacceptable to aspire to be a gentleman—or a godly man. Society demanded that men get in touch with their feminine side, and other things that I did not understand.

Traditional God-fearing integrity and gentlemanly strength was under attack; the only safe place to demonstrate manhood was in the arena of sports; and even there, one had to be cautious. So, to hear Bethany Hamilton publicly tell our young men; "We need you to be men," was a breath of fresh air.

But then I thought; "How will the generations 'be men' without

In that moment, as I looked around the New Orleans Super Dome, surrounded by 20,000 young people; I began to reflect on my dad; ever since 1967 I watched him stand alone in the midst of these things—he did his best to teach my brothers and I about integrity and honesty—he demanded of us, hard work and strength and kindness, while other dads fell. And I found myself saddened at the thought of his generation finishing its race and joining that great cloud of witnesses of which St Paul speaks.

I say that I find myself saddened, because when they are gone, who will take their place; who will teach the skills of God pleasing manhood?

If this sounds like a call to arms; that's because it is. Many of you know what it is to be a godly man, and many of you are succeeding and have succeeded in raising up godly men; for that, I thank you. But there is still much to do, many boys in our culture have no one to show them how to be the men God created them to be. So, I ask you to consider them also, in your community life, in your work life, and in your church life.

## The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod Stewardship Ministry Newsletter Article – August 2025

### Jesus' transforming presence

*"But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, 'Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount.' Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost'" (Luke 19:8-10 NIV).*

Who knew, all those kids sitting in Sunday school were getting a lesson in stewardship! Generations of children have very often heard lessons based on the familiar account of Zacchaeus. The diminutive tax collector's curiosity surrounding the person and ministry of Jesus is what the Holy Spirit used to set him on a collision course for a total stewardship transformation. This transformation, according to the text of Luke 19, is not just about this life. This stewardship transformation is about eternity as well!

Remember the story: Zacchaeus was a tax collector. Do not think of friendly neighborhood IRS agents. This was more like a toll booth operator, but the governing authorities did not set the toll. They would contract men to staff roadside booths and tax the commerce that was passing along the road. This was an enterprise full of greed and graft. The tax collectors would take as much as they could and only pass on a portion to the government. The rest did not go into the community chest either! It went into the pocket of the tax collector.

This is why the people had such disdain for Jewish tax collectors. They were seen as both crooks and traitors. They were crooks in that they extorted their compatriots and others in the toll process. But worse, they were seen as traitors because their efforts supported the occupying Roman authorities. That is the real reason that the people would not make way so that short Zacchaeus could see Jesus.

For this reason, he runs ahead and climbs a tree. He had heard all the stories. He wanted to see this Jesus with his own eyes. Mercy is on display. This hated crook and traitor gets a direct audience with Jesus — at Jesus' own request! Jesus invites Himself to Zacchaeus' house. This is where the transformation is about to take place!

Notice how Jesus does it. He does not preach a three-week sermon series, nor does He ask Zacchaeus to make a pledge. There is nothing programmatic about Jesus' approach. But Zacchaeus is completely transformed! The transforming force is the very presence of Jesus!

Direct time with Jesus takes a crooked, selfish, criminal and makes him the most faithful steward.

This new life of stewardship is marked by the promises made. First, he gives half of his ill-gotten gains to the poor. These are people whom he would not have defrauded at all! Yet, after spending time with Jesus, they are His first concern. Only after this does he double the requirement of the Levitical law on fraud. And what does Jesus say is the result? Salvation!

Doing the acts of stewardship does not save. Rather, the faith in Jesus that is created by the Holy Spirit is what saves! This is critical for us to confess. Failed stewardship can and will cut you off from God. The only antidote for failed stewardship is the presence of Jesus.

We do not need to run ahead and climb a tree for this presence of Jesus. He makes Himself available to us every week in the Divine Service. He speaks His Word of invitation to us in the pages of Holy Scripture. This, and this alone, transforms us from sinner to saint, from owner to steward of all that belongs to the Lord.

Do you want to become a more faithful steward? Spend more time with Jesus. Make the Divine Service a weekly priority. Feast on Christ's body and blood weekly! This is the great gift that brings salvation from God's House to yours!

## PEACE TALK

Unwanted. That can describe an experience that could be painful and isolating. In contemporary society, encountering rejection, isolation, or neglect is not an unusual experience. For various reasons this can occur due to hatred, abandonment, or spite. Whatever the culprit, the unwanted reality is like being tossed into the wind like chaff. If you are living in an experience like this, misery loves company. It might help to make you aware that there is a man I know quite well that could relate to all these things. He was first accused of being an illegitimate child (John 8:41). They say He was a deceiver (John 7:12), and that He must be plain "nuts" (John 10:20). The poor guy was even accused of being a blasphemer (Mark 2:7). Not only that, but people misunderstood His Words (John 21:22-23) and twisted them into lies (Matthew 26:60-61). Of course, you know by now that I am talking about my friend Jesus Christ. The rumors that were flying around when He dwelled on earth amid those that hated Him were brutal. Yet, He went about His way undeterred. He was an innocent Man that was accused of crimes He did not commit. Despised, stricken, smitten and afflicted (Isaiah 53:3-4). His rejection ultimately led to His death on the cross. Why did He endure all this? Jesus willingly accepted this abuse so our sins could be paid in full. The suffering I deserved was taken upon Him for the forgiveness of my sins. What a demonstration of selfless love for those who believe in Him. That truth will give us better understanding now when we go about society and the evil one works at making you "unwanted." When we face those that question our judgement, ethics, or Christian values. People who will gossip about us and attempt to make us into something we are not. Now it is starting to sound like what the disciples had to endure. We will have to expect to be treated in the same manner (John 15:20). Truth to be told, if you are truly serving the Lord, you are expected to experience these things. If you strive to "do as Jesus did", you must expect to be lied about, and others will believe the lies. If Jesus is really working within you, I predict you will fall victim to rumors, gossip, slander, and all sorts of things. There is a saying, "If you want to find an Apostle, look under a rock." However, be comforted to know that Jesus will be under that rock with you. He will be with you when you get attacked in so many unwanted ways. Look to Him, for He will be your strength and shield (Psalm 28:7). His love will enable you to love those who have made themselves your enemy. God's love will cast out all your fears. Dear Lord, give me strength when I feel unwanted and help me to turn my rejection into your reflection. Amen.
