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Hello again,

Are you familiar with the word; "druthers?" It's an old American English term that refers to a person's choice or preference. I'm not sure if this word is used much anymore, but it was a word often used by my parents. For example, when, at age seven, I had the chickenpox over Christmas break, and I complained that I couldn't go outside and play in the snow, my Mom would say; "If I had my druthers, you'd be well enough to go out and play, but you're not so get back in bed."

Along this same line, I received a bunch of Bible related games as a Christmas gift this Christmas. Among these games, intended to be used for middle school class on Sundays, was a book entitled; "Would You Rather." The book is full of druthers; for example; "Would you rather taste the manna that fell from heaven; or taste the bread that was multiplied to feed the 5,000?" (Exodus 16 & John 6). "Would you rather easily forgive your siblings; or easily confront your friends?" (Matthew 5 & Matthew 18). If you had your druthers; which would you choose?

These druthers are pleasant to consider, because we know their context, and their outcome, but the folks involved did not know how things would turn out for them; they were forced to trust that the Lord was on their side. The

hungry multitude in the wilderness made it very clear that if they had their druthers—they'd be back in Egypt sitting around pots of food.

As Joseph forgave his brothers for the evil they had done to him; his tears revealed that if he had his druthers, he would have preferred a way that did not involve being separated from family. Yet in every situation the Lord stayed with His people and saw them through.

As I consider these things, I've come to realize that when I say; "If I had my druthers..." it's because I am in the midst of uncertainty, or something that is beyond my control. But I've also come to believe that when faced with the uncertainties of life, I can trust the Lord to see me through.

If you find yourself thinking; "If I had my druthers..." then take heart; the Lord is on your side, and He will not abandon you, but will see you through. God's peace to you. Pastor

It's hard to believe that it's already almost February! We have a very busy, fun-filled month ahead of us! We will be having Silly socks and sunglasses day for S week.



## Table of Duties: The Forgotten Stewardship Tool

Luther's Small Catechism is a magnificent tool. Joined with a well-used copy of the Holy Scriptures and an orthodox hymnal, and the Christian is well equipped to live a life of faithfulness to the Lord and service to the neighbor. First in German and now in English and just about any language known to man, this handy masterpiece has introduced generations of people to the central doctrine of justification by grace, through faith, on account of Jesus Christ. The Six Chief Parts have proven to be a faithful framework for a clear confession of the truth of the Gospel for nearly five hundred years!

But more than a textbook, the Small Catechism also serves well as a handbook for Christian living. As a part of its treasure, there is an element that teaches an extraordinarily strong message of stewardship. That hidden treasure that needs to be rediscovered is called the Table of Duties.

The Table of Duties is really nothing more than a categorized gathering of Bible verses. These verses are set apart for "various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities." Addressing pastors and people, government and citizens, husbands, wives, children, youth, workers and so many more, it very clearly lays out what faithful stewardship looks like. Even better, these assembled passages teach one important truth: we are stewards of one another!

The Table is much more than a "how-to" tool; it also lays out the interconnectedness that exists within the body of Christ. Pastors are described by what they are to be as stewards of the Word. 1 Timothy 3 highlights the characteristics of a faithful pastor. Even more, Titus 1 highlights the need for the pastor to be faithful for the sake of those under his care.

Those who hear the faithful preaching of the pastor are stewards of the pastor as well. 1 Corinthians 9 talks about the need for the people to support the livelihood of the pastor. Galatians 6 talks about how the hearers share in the good things that the pastor teaches. 1 Timothy 6 talks about the honor that is owed to the pastor, not because of WHO he is, but rather WHAT he is teaching! Hebrews 13 shows the impact of this stewardship on the pastor, that they perform their duties with joy. Joyful pastors and people are always going to be better stewards of the Gospel!

Outside the church this interdependent stewardship is on display as well. Romans 13 highlights the respect necessary for the governing authorities. As citizens, the faithful steward is called to pay taxes (Matthew 22), pray for their leaders (1 Timothy 2) and that they should be ready to serve in the civil realm (Titus 3), because they are in these positions by God's direction (1 Peter 2).

These steward duties are in the home too! 1 Peter 3 and Colossians 3 shape the husband steward. Ephesians 5 and 1 Peter 3 shape the wife steward. Ephesians 6 form parental stewards and child stewards.

The Table of Duties is a wonderful place for the individual steward to learn how much our stewardship is more than just a "me and Jesus thing!" In fact, it ends with these words: "Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well share fare." This is interdependent stewardship on clear display. As each learns stewardship in this way, the more faithful we will be as a family, congregations, communities and the church at large.

## PEACE TALK

"Dee-fense... dee-fense!" This chant will frequently echo across a sports arena, especially when the game at hand becomes intense. This prominent cheer of enthusiastic sports fanatics is often prompted by someone holding up a sign with the letter "D" in one hand, and the picture of a "fence" in the other. However, defense is only half of the equation. Every team must also play offense. This sets up opposing sides for the argument... Is having a good defense the best offense? Or is a good offense the best defense? In the world of sports strategy, the debate between offense and defense is ongoing. Coaches and players alike often emphasize one over the other to secure a victory within athletic battles. This brings me to my case in point... which side of the ball is more critical in my spiritual battles? In this context, the Apostle Paul can be seen on the sidelines holding up his "D-fence" sign. In his letter to the Ephesians, he says to play defense by arming yourself with the whole armor of God (Ephesians 6:10-20). Just as in sports, spiritual defense requires vigilance, preparation, and the courage to stand firm against challenges. Paul says this defensive strategy in our daily trials of life include the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, and the shield of faith. When we use this defensive strategy, God will protect us from our evil opponent (2 Thessalonians 3:3). But what about offense? Paul also explains that part of our defensive armor is standing firm in the Gospel, putting on the helmet of salvation, and using the sword of God's Word to cut through the enemy lines. This defense suddenly becomes our best offense. Paul's letter invites us not only to guard our hearts, but to press forward with an offensive attack, armed with faith and conviction, ready to share hope and love in a world filled with conflict. But keep in mind, we cannot do this alone. We can only accomplish these scoring drives with Christ (John 15:5). You see... in spiritual battles, victory is not found merely by blocking the attacks, but by responding actively... through prayer, kindness, and seeking justice (Micah 6:8). Then thanks be to God, victory will be found through Christ (1 Corinthians 15:57). Through Christ, every challenge becomes an opportunity for triumph, and every moment invites us to press onward, no matter what lies ahead (Philippians 4:13). So, whether in the roar of the stadium or the quiet moments of contemplation, the balance between defense and offense thus shape the outcome of our most important struggles. By embracing both, we participate fully in the game of life, equipped for whatever may come. And when the game is over, our victory will be filled with high fives and celebration (Psalm 100). Knowing that our offense is backed up by our Lord's defense (Psalm 18:2). Dear Lord, thank you for giving me a victorious game plan as you guide my offense and defensive strategies, through the gift of faith. Amen.
