Luke 18:27 "But he said. "What is impossible with men, is possible with God."

he other day I was musing through "famous last words" that came to me in an email. I found some of them pretty interesting, but this goes to show you the limitations man puts on himself. Here are some of them:

"This 'telephone' has too many shortcomings to be seriously considered as a means of communication. The device is inherently of no value to us." --Western Union internal memo, 1876. Of course we can see that the telephone revolutionized the communication industry, and just look at what this idea morphed into with cell phones.

"Everything that can be invented has been invented." -- Charles H. Duell, Commissioner, U.S. Office of Patents, 1899. We see new ideas, and new inventions every day that seek to make our lives easier. Mr. Duell, way back in 1899, couldn't have been more wrong.

"The wireless music box has no imaginable commercial value. Who would pay for a message sent to nobody in particular?" -- David Sarnoff's associates in response to his urgings for investment in the radio in the 1920s. As we know, the radio has blossomed into a way to get information out guickly and has become for us entertainment. The radio makes possible ministries like KNGN that put the Word of God out over the airwaves so those who can not attend church are able to still hear it.

"I think there is a world market for maybe five computers." --Thomas Watson, chairman of IBM, 1943.

"Computers in the future may weigh no more than 1.5 tons." -- Popular Mechanics, forecasting the relentless march of science, 1949

"But what ... is it good for?" -- Engineer at the Advanced Computing Systems Division of IBM, 1968, commenting on the microchip.

"There is no reason anyone would want a



computer in their home." -- Ken Olson, president, chairman and founder of Digital Equipment Corp., 1977.

The computer has revolutionized everything we do today. In some fit or fashion computer technology has crept into almost every aspect of our lives. As we know, industry now continues to look for new ways to use computer applications and technology.

What is so amazing to me here is that those people in the business of developing technology were putting a cap on what it was they could and could not make. What is even more amazing is how we have advanced technologically despite ourselves.

Is it possible that today, we too might put limitations on where the Holy Spirit works in the church. As we reach these summer months, it is no longer a necessity to stay indoors and not be out among God's people. It is a time for interaction and letting the Spirit work within us and through us as we move forward in our ministry here at Peace.

Have you given much thought to where God is at work in the midst of His church? Have you given much thought to where He is using you to advance His kingdom here on earth? What is His vision for our future? What does He want to see accomplished, or better yet see us be part of accomplishing? There will likely be those who want to tell you that "it can't be done", or "we've tried

This year, children from the ages of 3 years through the 6th grade had an opportunity to experience the sights and sounds of "Hometown Nazareth" at Peace Lutheran Church's annual Vacation Bible School.

The Nazareth program was structured a bit different than what has been done normally in the past. Children were gathered into tribal families, named after the 12 Tribes of Israel. From there, they met with their leaders to talk about where in Nazareth they were going to go that day.

that before and so we shouldn't try that again,", or "it's too much trouble".

I look back over the past month and have seen the church in action. We had a wonderful Vacation Bible School. We had many children here in our facility – some who know who Jesus is and whose parents think that it is important enough that they receive this kind of exposure to their Lord, and those who did not know Jesus, but do now through the love and care of people who have a heart for ministry. Many thanks to all who helped out that week.

But ministry is not about doing something to help others hear the message about Jesus and saying, "I'm done." It is a continual act of those Jesus calls to be disciples – being that living confession of faith. There are many other activities coming to us on the horizon. Our Youth will be in full swing selling fireworks as their annual fundraiser by the time this comes out. However, there is more to it than just selling fireworks. As DCE Intern Brad Rogers and I have been discussing, we are reshaping our youth program to develop Christian leaders, and that everyone who participates with us is part of our ministry team. I am so encouraged that the youth and their parents see the importance of giving back to God for the blessings they receive in the fireworks sales. They will be making a donation to the Joplin, MO relief efforts.

Our Bible studies continue and are open for others to join. We have the Monday night Women's Bible Study, the Saturday morning Men's Bible Breakfast, Sunday Bible Study (we just began a study of the Book of Revelation and all are welcome to join us.) Brad is working on a class for adults and senior High Youth that focuses on what it is we believe. Let's not leave out our Sunday morning Sunday School classes for the children.

As I said there are many things on the horizon. To name a few (the list is not all inclusive) that are in the planning stages, Russ Ankersen, our Congregation President, is leading a committee aimed at expanding our contemporary worship from one Sunday to two per month. There are a lot of needs for help in this service, and I am sure his committee would welcome those who want to be part of that ministry. The Stewardship committee is planning our annual church picnic. Our School of Religion is getting ready to begin a new school year. Our preschool is full for the next school year, and there is another committee looking at providing a nursery during our Sunday worship and Sunday School hour so parents can attend worship and Bible Study. We support those of our faith in nursing homes by providing monthly worship services, and more.

We praise God for the work of the Holy Spirit among us and how God uses us as His instruments to proclaim the Gospel. In all of this we very quickly come to the conclusion that it is not us who are doing all of these things, but God doing His work through us. All that we do, whether supporting our mission and ministry through our donations, or with our time, and talents, is all to the glory of God.

Peace Lutheran Church's FIRE Youth Ministry exists to <u>extend</u> Jesus' love to all senior high school students, to help them <u>grow</u> in their relationship with the Lord, to <u>praise</u> and **honor** God in Christian <u>service</u>, and to <u>care</u> for one another.

The world has a distorted view of who we are and what we should be about; and it does not match what God desires for each one of us. In Jesus, God sees each one of us as His beloved child; and through Christ, we are so much more. Each one of us is <u>called</u> to be so much more. As disciples of Jesus, <u>we are called to change the world for Jesus Christ.</u> Our goal, through the Holy Spirit, is to help youth and families do just that. *FIRE youth ministry strives to prepare, nurture and equip youth and adults to be Christian leaders prepared for service, living a life of faith, beyond this time and place.*

As I shared awhile back, we are trying to be intentional with each aspect of youth ministry; that it would help support our mission and goal of preparing youth to be Christian leaders. In talking with Pastor Tom and the Board of Education, we were looking for a curriculum that would help support us in this goal. We believe we have found that with Group Publishing's LIVE. It is a four-year curriculum created specifically for high school students, intending to guide teenagers toward a Jesus-centered life. It also has a family component which allows families to keep that week's discussion going at home.

I am excited about this curriculum's potential; and to see how God will work through it to prepare Christian leaders. This curriculum will be the primary resource used for Wednesday night FIRE, starting towards the end of July, early August. Wednesday night FIRE is a chance for fellowship, Bible study, prayer, fun and activities.

If you are a high school student, I invite you to join us for Wednesday night FIRE each Wednesday from 7:30-8:30pm in the youth room, <u>starting July 13</u>; unless noted otherwise. And bring a friend too! If you are the parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle, cousin, sibling or friend of a teenager, please encourage them to join us. Thank you for your love for teenagers.

If you would like more information about what is going on in FIRE youth ministry, be sure to check your family's PLC mailbox as I put out a monthly youth ministry newsletter discussing the who, what, when, where, cost, of various opportunities available to youth and adults as part of PLC FIRE youth ministry.
