Hello again, I'd like to share with you an experience I had the other day while standing in line at the cash register at Orscheln Farm & Home; an experience in which I found myself challenged with a question; "What kind of a people have we become?" As I stood in line, I was thinking about cheeseballs-wondering if I should get some-are they really good for me; you see, I was trying to get into vacation mode, and Emmett and I have a tradition of getting a big BIG jar of cheeseballs when we do projects that require going to Orscheln. So as I stood pondering the value of cheeseballs, the man at the front of the line, forcefully pushed himself back from the counter, pointed at the note that had been taped to the counter-pointed at the plexiglass screen between him and the cashier, and he blurted out; "Social distancing-that's what's destroying our nation!" He then looked at me while pointing accusingly at the cashier behind the screen and shouted; "Restaurants are losing business because of social distancing-and it's destroying our nation!" But when I tried to engage in the conversation, he quickly cut me off and continued his rant as he headed out the door. The cashier looked at me and apologized. I told her it wasn't her fault. We both shrugged our shoulders and went on. But as I walked back to my truck, my mind was racing; "Does he really believe that the interruption of conveniences, such as eating out, has destroyed our nation?" And I wondered how many others share his opinion. Is the world really coming to an end because I can't have a sit-down meal at McDonalds?

As I shook my head in disbelief, I found myself confronted with many questions about what we value as a people; "convenience vs. the value of human life?" "Convenience vs. hard work and responsibility?" "Convenience vs. love

of neighbor?"

These things brought to mind something in which my previous employer prided himself. You see, before I became a pastor, I worked for 24 years in the printing industry. The owner of the company I worked for prided himself on being one of, what he considered, a diminishing number of companies in our nation that still produced a product. I remember not understanding, at the time, his lamenting that we are becoming a nation of consumers rather than a nation of producers.

But as I pondered these things in light of the fears of the man at Orscheln, I ask myself; "What do we as a nation really value?" "Where do we Christians find ourselves in relation to that value system?" And most importantly; "What do I as a child of God, really believe?" St. Paul wrote, "What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us?" (Romans 8:31).

Our times are different, there's no doubt about that! But in our everchanging times, God remains steady—His Word remains true, and His faithfulness toward you is never-ending. "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." (Hebrews 13:8).

So, as the people of the world express their fears and uncertainties, in ways you may not understand, I encourage you to take heart; don't let their fears and uncertainties become your own. God is still in control, and He knows what He is doing.

"There are three conversions necessary to every man: the head, the heart, and the purse." Attributed to Luther, though yet to be located in his vast writings, this statement echoes what Jesus taught about hearts and treasures. He said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34)

But which conversion comes first? I submit that the order is this: first the head, then the purse, then the heart. Let's explore this topic.

Our Lord Jesus Christ dwelt among us to save us. He took on our flesh, fulfilled the demands of the law in our place, became sin for us, and suffered torture and death on our behalf. He did this in order that we would be free from sin, death, and hell. He gives us what He accomplished through Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord's Supper. And so, He doesn't just do it for us but gives it to us. He makes what He did ours by making us His. Thus, we are called by His name: Christians. We have a new life in Him.

Through the preaching of Law and Gospel, God grants us repentance, a changing of our minds. It is a conversion of the mind. We are called to turn away from our sins and turn toward Him for forgiveness, life, and salvation. For when God calls us away from something, He is, at the same time, calling us to something.

And thus, He calls us to a new life, with new deeds. This is the conversion of the purse. Jesus said that "it is easier for a camel to enter through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." (Matthew 19:24) "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Notice that our hearts follow our treasures, not the other way around. As Christians, God calls us to invest our treasures in His Kingdom to ensure that the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. He calls us to share all good things with the one who teaches us the doctrines of Christ. He calls us to be generous in giving to the church, for it is more blessed to give than to receive.

So where is your treasure? If it is not invested in the kingdom of God, then the only response is repentance - a conversion of the heart - and to begin doing just that. And as our Lord promised, where your treasure is there your heart will be also.

This is not to say that you earn your way into heaven. It is simply to say that as Christians, those who have been made to be temples of the Holy Spirit, who have been given a new life in Christ, who are dead to sin and now alive in Him, we are actually to live - think (conversion of the mind), do (conversion of the purse), and be (conversion of the heart) - a new life in Him. And when you fail, know that God in Christ loves and forgives you and still calls you away from that and to Himself.

# FROM AN ELDER

"Have you not read that he who created them from the beginning made them male and female nd said, 'Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh'? So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man separate." Matthew 19: 4-6

Greetings friends in Christ. I write this article with the fervent hope that you have read and seriously thought about the insert contained in the bulletin Sunday morning entitled, "*Two Concerns for the Church.*" If you have not, I am sure that a copy can be found at the church office.

Basically what the insert calls our attention to is two government proposed "laws" which fundamentally change the "freedom of religion" right quaranteed by the U.S. Constitution.

The first concern is with the **Equality Act** currently before Congress in Washington D.C. This act would elevate sexual orientation to a protected class and thus bring sweeping changes to current laws. This act could force churches to abandon their faith-based hiring standards, force religious schools to abandon their faith-based admission standards, force women to share restroom/locker room facilities with men, force female athletes to compete against males who identify themselves as females and force millions of Christians (and other religious groups) to violate their protected religious views on marriage and sexual morality. This will be to the great detriment of religious and constitutional freedoms of biblically faithful churches, institutions, schools, and individuals. This act would punish churches for adhering to Word of God Concerning marriage between man and a woman. The "Equality Act" effectively outlaws the words of Christ and our free exercise of religion.

The "Equality Act" expands the definition of "public accommodation" and issues an ultimatum individuals, religious non-profits, food banks, schools, charities, adoption agencies and others that they "change your faith-based practices or face government punishment." In other words churches will not be allowed to preach the word of God without receiving government punishment.

The next concern is the <u>K-12 Health Standards</u> currently being. considered by the Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) for all Nebraska public <u>and</u> non-public schools. These proposed standards are a deeply-flawed ideologically-driven document. If these standards are adopted, our culture will move toward further normalization of child sexualization.

Go to the NDE website and read the proposed Health Standards, especially the "Human Growth and Development" section for each grade. Some highlights include:

- 1) <u>Kindergarten students</u> discuss different kinds of family structures including single parent, blended, intergenerational, cohabitating, adoptive, foster, same-gender, and inter-rail. Marriage between a mand and a woman IS NOT MENTIONED.
- 2) 1st grade students will define gender, gender-role, and stereotypes. birth and gender identity adoptive, foster, same-gender
- 3)  $4^{\frac{1}{10}}$  grade students will distinguish between sex-assigned and explain how they may or may not differ.
- 4) 8th grade students will be taught that abortion is 'reproductive care"

# PEACE TALK

Schools out and summer is about to begin. Time to dust off the camping supplies and head out in the wilderness to live off the land for a weekend. Tent, check. Fishing gear, check. Water bottles, check. First aid kit, check. Sleeping bag, check. Flashlight, check. You go through the list and check it twice, then pack the truck. A secluded area awaits as you head out early the next day to reach your destination. Unpack the supplies, setup camp and before you know it evening rolls around. The nights are still a bit cold so you will need to start a campfire. If you have ever tried to start a campfire and keep it going all night, you know it has to be done just right. You will need the proper materials and some skill. A great campfire starts with some wood shavings at the bottom. Then add some kindling and dry wood piled up just right, allowing for proper airflow. Finally, you are ready to rub a stick on a rock to create the initial spark. Discovering and using our God-given gifts and devotion takes the same dedication and careful attention as starting and maintaining that campfire. Our gifts from God are ignited when we believe and use them for His purposes. Because God wants us to "fan our gifts into flames," He gives us exactly what we need to identify and develop them: a spirit of boldness, power, love and self-discipline. "For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands, for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control," (2 Timothy 1:6-7). Not everyone has the same gift to give. Truth to be told, if I do ever go camping, I would need A/C, indoor plumbing, satellite TV, and a propane fire pit. The point is we all have gifts that God has given us to use for His glory. When we love the way Jesus loves, our passion reveals our gifts. Once identified, self-discipline, perseverance, and regular use will develop our gift into the perfect instrument of God's will. And when we let God work through us for His purposes, He gives us the power to use our gifts in many ways. Then watch as the fire God ignites within us though these gifts cannot be contained like a campfire or propane fire pit. God will give us the boldness to use our gifts to serve others, to fan our flame into a roaring bonfire whose light could pierce the darkness for miles "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven," (Matthew 14-16). Lord, help me to recognize my gifts so I can serve you, my Church, and whoever might be in need. Amen.
