Hello again, Have you ever wondered why the celebration of Reformation falls on the same day as Halloween? I have often wondered about that, and it seems that others have as well. In the little bit of searching, I have done thus far, it seems that there are many different opinions out there about the origin of Halloween, and how it evolved into the Americanized holiday that has influenced our culture, and many other cultures throughout the world.

Opinions about Halloween are Many and varied; some assert that it is nothing more than a harmless harvest festival that ushers in the darker, or shorter days of winter; while others have traced its roots to pagan practices and summer sacrifices to appease a pagan lord of death and his evil spirits. These things have led to many other bazar and distinctly unchristian practices and behaviors that have evolved into the wearing of scarry masks and consumes on that particular night.

Some medieval European Christians recognized the danger in those practices and tried to offer a Christian alternative that celebrated the lives of faithful Christian saints, thus assigning Novembre 1st as "All Hallows' Day," which, by default, labeled October 31st as "All Hallows' Eve". Those who assert these things also assert that this led to what we now call All Saints' Day.

All Saints' Day is the only connection I have found thus far, as to why Martin

Luther chose October 31st as the day he would nail his 95 Theses against indulgences to the door of the Wittenberg church; it had nothing to do with Halloween, but rather, it had everything to do with his desire that biblical truth be the only basis for faith, and he knew that on the next morning, November 1st, All Saints' Day, many influential Christians would be in attendance at the castle church at Wittenberg to view the collection of some 5,000 plus relics that would be on display; relics owned by Frederick the Wise, Elector of Saxony. Martin Luther's decision to post his 95 Theses when he did, seems to simply be a matter of logistics; All Saints' Day would offer the best opportunity for the largest number of influential people to read his theses against false teachings. Little did he know what God had in store. Through that single act of courage, the massage of salvation by grace through faith in Jesus, has once again been restored to its proper place in the church, for there is no other name by which one can be saved.

I thank you for your time today. As I learn more, I will share with you. Until then, let us hold fast to the truths of Holy Scripture.

They were friends, probably in the same grade, and their parents were content that they were spending time together. These two girls were God's children, regardless of their ancestry or race. What an example they set for all people, especially we adults, how we should treat one another. In Genesis chapter 1, we are told that God made man in His image. But over the centuries, due to sin, mankind strayed from what God had intended. These two girls made me feel aware that at times I don't treat other people as I should. But I'm not alone in that, because we all are guilty of such thoughts and behavior. Because we are born in sin, we should ask for God's help in treating each other as we should, especially fellow Christians. We are all God's children, made in His image. May we all remember to treat each other accordingly!

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The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod Stewardship Ministry Newsletter Article - November 2021

Sometimes people don't like it when pastors talk about stewardship. For some, it hits too close to home. It is easier to talk about bad people in Washington, in history, or wherever than it is to think about what our daily life in Christ is supposed to look like and how we are supposed to love our neighbor.

The fact that we don't like it certainly means we ought to face it. So, here are a few simple and practical realities.

God calls us to first-fruits, sacrificial giving. That means that we should give off the top. We should set a percentage of our income as a deliberate gift for the work of the Church and then give that first. We write the check to the Lord's work in the Church before we pay the mortgage or pay for our medicine or pay for anything else. We don't pay for all the stuff we need - and stuff we think we need - and then give from what is left over. That is the first-fruits idea. It is hard because we think we need all sorts of other things first. But that is the point of "sacrificial."

Next, how could the starting point for Christian generosity and sacrifice really be anything less than a tithe – 10%? The ceremonial law of the Old Testament was never arbitrary. In the Old Testament, the Levites received this tithe so that they could be full-time ministers.

Does the New Testament have a ministry that is larger or smaller? It is far larger: "Make disciples of *all nations*" (Matt. 28:19). And we are still to have a full-time ministry: "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor 9:14). So if 10% is what it took in the Old Testament, and we have a bigger mission need in the New Testament, how can we expect the Lord's work to be done on less than a tithe?

By first-fruits, sacrificial, and generous giving - that's how. We shouldn't fool ourselves into thinking that we've outgiven God's goodness or that we've given plenty. We might be tempted to think that way, but consider that no one in the Church has given plenty because no one has given all. No one has died for his sins. Only the sinless Son of God did that.

St. Paul brought the Good News of Jesus into the discussion of our giving to support the Lord's work in the Church when he wrote: "I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Cor. 8:8-9).

As you can see, what the Bible commands about our stewardship can sting. It's Law, and the Law shows our sins. It calls us to repentance. The Law is meant to expose and accuse for the sake of showing us Christ and His fulfillment of the Law. So if first-fruits, sacrificial giving has you squirming, that's the point.

In Mark's account of the feeding of the 4,000, Jesus took the disciples' seven loaves and blessed them. It was nothing among so many, but, of course, it was plenty. Jesus makes something from nothing. Mark doesn't say that all the disciples gave Jesus all the bread they had. It is quite possible that some of them held something back. But even if they did, that didn't stop Jesus from blessing them. Jesus makes something out of nothing. He, who fed His people in the desert with Manna every morning, doesn't need their bread.

But they need to give it. And what they give - however little it might be and however grudgingly they do so - He blesses. He not only blesses those whom He feeds with it, but He blesses them - the givers. He blesses the givers not just in that they wind up with a basketful for each loaf, but they are blessed by learning to trust and rejoice in Him.

The Lord gives, and the Lord takes away. The Lord gives abundantly, or He asks us to fast. We do not know what will happen. Blessed be the Name of the Lord. He does all things well, and He works all things together for good. The disciples don't give their bread to Jesus because it is a good investment. They give it because He is good, because they love Him, and because they trust Him. Let us go and do likewise.

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PEACE TALK

Do you know what is contagious and the best medicine all at the same time? Something that can make you hurt and feel good simultaneously? That magical thing my friends is Laughter. If you have laughed until your sides hurt, or laughed until you cried, you know what I am talking about. Many times, this happens when children are around, they will say and do things that are just plain funny. We are always recalling something that was said or done by our precious miniature comedians, and laugh for months afterwards. I have also experienced a grieving time where family would gather, and at an appropriate time, someone would recall a funny memory. The next thing you know the room would erupt in laughter. The healing effect of laughter works at the core of all emotions. In the context of these wide range of reactions, laughter was written about many times in the Bible; "A time to weep and a time to laugh" (Ecclesiastes 3:4), "A joyful heart is good medicine." Here is a quote from Pastor Don Thran, Our Savior Lutheran Church, Lansing Iowa; "Laughter is a good icebreaker for people to get to know one another. It's such a fantastic outreach that it's hardly a laughing matter." What a wonderful statement as we go out into the broken world to share the joyous message of our risen Lord and Savior and how God had the last laugh over death. When Jesus was buried in the tomb, and on the third day rose again, all believers were filled with laughter and tears of joy. If we would incorporate laughter with our faith, what would that look like? Would we actually smile with joy before or after the sacraments and absolution? When we sing praises to the Lord, would we lift up our hands to the heavens (Psalm 134)? When we give thanksgiving to the Lord for all He has given us would we "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord" (Psalm 100)? What an evangelizing thought as all would see what joy there is to know Jesus. My heart leaps for joy for all God has given and blessed me with, and I should LOL and show my neighbor how happy that makes me to know that same gift is theirs, if they just believe. Now that is truly good medicine that will be eternally contagious. Dear Lord, thank you for giving me the means of grace and the emotions to show my joy with laughter, help us share that eternal joy with others. Amen.
