Jeff and Elaine Polly have shared a newspaper article that was published in the Gazette a number of years ago about the origins of the area churches. The article about Peace was written by Rev. R. Staehr. Here are some of the highlights:

### Peace Lutheran Church Formed By 8 Members

In 1907 the Nebraska District of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, authorized the mission board of the district to call a missionary for McCook. At that time, several Lutheran families were residing in McCook and were being served by neighboring Lutheran pastors from White, Bartley, and Ash Creek. It was felt by the church that a resident pastor should be called to this particular field. The call was extended to the Rev. William Brueggemann, who began his ministry in McCook in the year 1908. Upon his arrival in McCook, Rev. Brueggemann began canvassing the town and the surrounding country, looking not only for Lutheran families but also for families without any church affiliation. The canvass proved to be quite successful. After several months of work and many visits, sufficient families were gathered so that not only regular Sunday services could be conducted but that a congregation could be organized. Peace Lutheran Church of McCook was organized on October 9, 1908. The following individuals are given as charter members: P.H. Blumck, Charles Ebert, Julius Hinz, Bernard Kotter, Fred Pfeffer, George Schrammel, William Unger, and Pastor William Brueggemann. Since the congregation did not have its own house of worship at the time of organization, services were first held in the Courthouse and later on the public school building on East 5th Street, known as the East Ward School. From the very beginning of its existence the congregation felt not only the advisability but rather the necessity of having its own place of worship. And soon after the organization the congregation resolved to build its first house of worship. A building site on East 6th and E streets was acquired on which the first church was erected. It was a 24X40 foot frame building. Dedication services were held on September 19, 1909. Sometime after the dedication of the church, a room was built on the back of the church, which was used for parochial school purposes until the late thirties. The school was first taught by the pastor of the church and later on by regularly called teachers or students. The church records state that in 1915 the congregation numbered 248 souls and 123 communicant member; 42 children were attending the church school. Some 35 years after the erection of the first church edifice, during the forties, the question of building a new church was given much thought and consideration. Finally, in a special meeting on December 13, 1948, the congregation resolved to build a new church. This building project is unique in that the members of the congregation took an active part in the program. The last service in the old church was held the last Sunday of February 1949; the next morning members of the congregation assembled and tore down the old structure. By Tuesday the job of removing the old building was complete. By Saturday of that same week the basement had been dug, the work again done by members of the congregation. The cornerstone was laid at ceremonies

on September 18, 1949. The new 34X110 foot church building was ready for dedication by the end of January, 1950. At that time the Gazette reported: "The new brick structure was completed in less than a year. Its dark pew will provide seating for 400 persons to join worship. And its stained glass, chancel windows will shed a soft light into the interior as the mellow tones of the new Baldwin organ lead the congregation in the hymn of thanksgiving this coming Sunday" In September 1954 a meeting resulting in the erection of the Christian Education Building, built to the south and connected to the church. This doubled the floor area of the church. The new Christian Education Building was dedicated in formal ceremonies where the keys were handed to Elsworth Friehe, chairman of the congregation's building committee. He in turn cut the ribbon placed across the two main doors at the tower entrance, and placed the main key in the door lock. The key was turned by the Rev. Rudolf Staehr, pastor of the church, and Vernon Nokes, president of the congregation. It was estimated that some 1,500 people attended the three special services. The church's guest register was signed by visitors from 5 states; 30 Nebraska, 7 Kansas, and 4 Colorado towns were represented. Peace Lutheran Church is in McCook not only to serve its own members, but also to serve the city and the surrounding neighborhood whenever and wherever possible. Therefore on December 19, 1954, Peace Lutheran Church began broadcasting the 11am Sunday morning worship services every Sunday over a local radio station, KBRL, in McCook. It is known as "Your Hour of Worship" The 900 member of Peace Lutheran Church in McCook are grateful to God to have had the opportunity for 56 years to help build the "Kingdom of God" in McCook, the surrounding country and throughout the world. All praise to God!



## PEACE TALK

Checkmate! I'm sure that is what you would tell me if I played you in a game of chess. Checkmate is declared in a chess match by the player that leaves the opponent with no more options to move. Namely the king, thus winning the game. This highly strategic game is a battle between two minds. My skills are limited with this game; however, I can tell you that the front row of the game board is lined with "pawns." You can only move it forward one space at a time diagonally, and there are quite a few of them. I would sacrifice a pawn if I could draw out my opponent's key players. Alternatively, I consider my queen as a valuable game piece. She can be moved any direction and as many unoccupied spaces as necessary. Not sacrificing her is a strategy of vital importance. In life there are many things I am willing to sacrifice like the pawns in chess. It could be soda, immediate desires, or television... these things would not be a great loss if I give them up. On the other hand, the key things in my life I value more... sports, electronic devices, or hobbies. Priorities in my life I try to protect. Unwilling to sacrifice them and give them up to God. Jesus asked a rich young ruler to give up all his possessions (Mark 10:17-27). A widow was honored when she gives all that she had in the offering (Luke 21:1-4). I sit back and ponder... Am I only willing to sacrifice the things in my life that I can do without, and not willing to sacrifice the things I want to protect? If I want to truly follow Christ, I must be willing to put myself in a position to face checkmate. I will have to sacrifice things that become my life's priorities and give more of my time and talents to God. Things I haven't been willing to let go of. Can you put yourself in a position of checkmate? In return, Jesus promises to give us more than we could ever ask for. Maybe it's time to stop sacrificing things that don't matter and start sacrificing things that do. Then if Jesus declares "checkmate", the game is not lost, you become a winner. Experiencing the full revelation of who He really is. The one who said, "I have given you an example to follow. Do as I have done to you," (John 13:14-15). Dear Lord, help me make sacrifices so I can serve you. Serving You by serving others. Amen.
